Municipality Holds Special Services Public Hearing

On March 6th the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone held a Public Hearing at the Gladstone District Community Centre to discuss a proposed special service levy for a Municipal Ditch Maintenance Program. Ditch and Drain Infrastructure within the municipality requires maintenance due to previous high-water conditions and other contributing factors. Council feels they have determined a taxation method to generate funds for this program that is appropriate for all those affected.

The proposed levy, as part of By-Law No. 2019-02, would affect all properties with Class 30 (Farm) and Class 10 (Rural Residential) land assessment. Council feels that the funds collected will go towards work that will be beneficial to all property owners. Approximately 600 miles of work is included in the proposal. This includes surveying, licensing, clean out to ditch bottom and vegetation clean out. The estimated cost of this work is \$725 220.

100 people registered at the Public Hearing and 21 of those made formal presentations. A public hearing is an effective approach for the municipality to receive feedback from the public. Council received 23 letters of objection signed by 35 taxpayers. Of the 21 presentations at the Public Hearing, 20 registered their presentation as an objection and one person registered their presentation as being in favor.

After reviewing objection letters and presentations, council gave first reading to By-Law No. 2019-02 and revised the Special Service Levy Proposal. A detailed description of the method available taxation is from the municipality. Generally, it includes a parcel rate of \$67.00 per parcel of land and a 0.35 mill rate. The special service levy will pertain to the years 2019, 2020 and 2021.

Potential taxpayers under this Special Services By-Law who object to the By-Law can file a notice of objection with the Secretary to the Municipal Board, 1144-363 Broadway, Winnipeg, Manitoba, R3C 3N9 within 30 days of March 15th, 2019. It is also important to continue to voice your opinion with your local councilors before the Second and Third Readings commence and the By-Law is approved.

Nature Notes

Yellow Warbler

This plump-bodied bird has wider range than any other North American nesting from Canada to Mexico and from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast. A habitat generalist, like many warblers, it feeds harmful leaf-eating caterpillars to its nestlings. When a cow bird invades and lays eggs in this warbler's nest, the female builds a roof over all of the eggs, both hers and the brood parasite's, and lays a new set on the 'new' nest floor. As many as six stories have been found in a single nest, each floor containing entombed cowbird eggs.

Bright red streaking on the male's underparts distinguishes him from the females and all other North American warblers. Females may have faint reddish streaking on their underparts. Juveniles resemble adult females.

Yellow Warblers live solitary or in pairs. They are tame and conspicuous. They forage in bushes, shrubs or trees. They glean food from branches and foliage, and sometimes hawk insects. They mostly eat insects, larvae and some fruit.

The nest is strongly built of plant material, grasses, moss, lichens, and fur bound with spider's silk and cocoon material. The nest is lined with fine materials. It is in the fork of a tree or bush 2 - 4 metres high (but up to 18 metres). The female mostly builds the nest while the male watches.

Incubation is 11-12 days by the female. The young are brooded by the female and remain in the nest for 9-12 days. They are fed by both sexes. There are 1-2 broods per year.

Yellow Warblers are common and widespread in riparian thickets, second-growth woodland, gardens, orchards and wetlands. They are a common host to cowbird parasitism.
