



Nature Notes

A common visitor at feeders in the northern US and Canada, south of the tundra, this bird leaves it's nesting ground in woodlands areas during autumn and feeds in suburban areas. The Black-Capped Chickadee rarely moves beyond the southern edge of its breeding range, but occasionally it will irrupt southward in large numbers during autumn. It occasionally hybridizes with Carolina Chickadee, in the overlapping zone, producing intergrades in size and song. It is the provincial bird of New Brunswick.

Black-Capped Chickadees live in pairs and form small groups after nesting season. They often join mixed foraging flocks with other species. They are tame. They forage among twigs and branches under bark, often clinging upside down, for insects and insect eggs. They eat seeds from conifers, bayberries and other fruit. They hold large seeds between their feet on the perch and pound the seed coat open with their beak. In winter, they eat mostly seeds. They feed on suet and sunflower seeds. The incubating female hisses like a snake when its nest cavity is disturbed.

The nest is lined with vegetation, moss, feathers, hair and insect cocoons in deciduous trees, conifers, snags or nest boxes. It is 1-12 metres above ground and is built by both sexes.

Incubation is 11-13 days by both sexes. The young are brooded by the female and remain in the nest for 14-18 days. They are fed by both sexes. There is 1 brood per year.
