The Municipality encourages all residents to recycle as much as possible. Recycling can be taken to the recycling bins in Langruth.



STARS Saves Lives in Manitoba

When a life is on the line and every minute counts STARS Air Ambulance is there for Manitobans. The STARS base in Winnipeg opened in 2011. Over 3,000 missions to more than 170 communities have been flown across the province since STARS launched in Manitoba. This includes 632 missions in the past fiscal year.

During a mission, the STARS helicopter is always staffed with two pilots and the air medical crew, made up of one flight nurse and one paramedic. The Air Medical Crew is required to complete more than 100 hours of training each year. Human patient simulators replicate complex medical and traumatic situations and offer medical personnel an opportunity to practice their reactions and skills.

Each helicopter is equipped to transport one critically injured patient but can be configured to transport two patients in special circumstances. STARS helicopters have a custom-designed medical interior to ensure top-level critical care. STARS is the first air ambulance service in Canada to stock blood in advance for life-saving transfusions on air medical missions.

The STARS' fleet currently consists of eight BK117 helicopters and three AW139 helicopters. One BK117 operates in Manitoba with a spare helicopter available for events or during maintenance periods. The crews are able to land in a variety of locations including highways, parking lots, fields, and other areas free of obstructions such as trees or power poles.

The Operational Outreach Program teaches how emergency responders can access STARS, how to land the helicopter and how to prepare patients for transport. STARS has provided thousands of local partners, including 155 fire departments, across the province with this training.

By supporting STARS you are helping to ensure the next time a patient needs an air ambulance, STARS will be there. You are helping to ensure the crews have the best possible equipment and training available to them. For more information please visit https://www.stars.ca/.

Nature Notes

Rose-Breasted Grosbeak



This bird's clear notes are delivered in robin like phrases, but the song is sweet. Males sing constantly, even while sparring to win a female. In flight the male shows rosy red wing linings, a white rump and black-tipped white uppertail coverts. The females flash yellow wing linings. First fall males have less streaking on underparts than females, buffy wash across the breast and rose-red wing linings. First spring males are similar to adult males but with brown edges to the black plumage.

Rose-Breasted Grosbeaks live in solitary or in pairs in the breeding season. They are in flocks in migration and winter. They forage in trees, shrubs and on the ground. They eat seeds, insects, caterpillars, tree flowers, fruits and berries. Hover gleans high in trees at branch tips. Females hover glean more than males.

The nest is of twigs, weeds and leaves, lined with fine twigs, rootlets and mammal hair. The nest is in vines, low trees or shrubs, 1-5 m above the ground (The nest can be up to 15m above the ground). The nest is mostly built by the female with some help from the male.

The male and female rub bills to display affection during courtship. Incubation is 13-14 days by both sexes. The young are brooded by both sexes but more by the female. They stay in the nest for 9-12 days and are fed by both sexes. The male tends the nest while the female begins a second nesting. There are 1-2 broods per year.

The Rose-Breasted Grosbeak is common to fairly common in deciduous forest, woodland and second growth. It is a common cowbird host and is a migrant.

The Icelandic National League of North America (INLNA) promotes Icelandic culture past and present, supports events that celebrate Icelandic culture and provides an organization for anyone interested in Iceland. The INLNA was founded in Winnipeg in 1919. The 100th anniversary convention was fittingly held in Winnipeg from May 16th to 19th. The conference was held at the Fairmont Hotel and featured music, sagas and cultural events. There presentations ranging from history to textile design, genealogy and Icelandic studies.

Last fall an organizer at Fibrefest invited Kory Jonasson to display his Icelandic wool and products at the convention as a vendor. Lynne Jonasson accompanied him to take in the convention.

Kory and Lynne had 2 enjoyable days of visiting and promoting their wool and sheep products. It was a great opportunity to share experiences with others and learn from the other vendors. They were able to make contacts for distributing their wool and met a couple of other Icelandic sheep breeders in the province who were also at the convention. Other vendors also had a wide array of items with the Icelandic themed products. Lynne brought home a "coffee sock" and coffee!

Kory and Lynne had a number people stop by their booth who had connections to the Langruth area. In true Icelandic fashion the introductions and stories began. They both had a very enjoyable weekend.

Hello Everyone! The weather has been kind of 'iffy' hasn't it? It has been warm one day and cold and windy the next. It seems like it is doing everything but rain. We are finally getting a little rain this morning. It was crackling with thunder this morning but it didn't amount to too much We are hoping for more rain for our rain. gardens, crops and hay. Margaret and Jenny Jonasson came out from Brandon for the day. They stopped in my house for a visit as well. Mary was surprised that there were no leaves on our branches. Our trees are usually fully leaved at this time of year. She mentioned that the trees are not doing that well in California either because of the fires and floods in the last few years. Mary says that her orange and lime trees are finally doing a little better but that is because she has been watering them.

I noticed that the strawberries and other berries are arriving from California. I imagine that a lot of them are being forced to produce because their weather hasn't been ideal for growing.
