

This picture shows those who started together in grade one and were in the same grade in the same classroom, together, until he/she was finished school in Langruth. However, there were spouses and a few extras present...Sixteen in all. There are some from our group who are now ill or deceased.

For our first two grades we were well taught by Mrs. Helga Jackson. She gave us an excellent grounding in all subjects. When I chose to go back to her for my practical teaching experience, I realized what an excellent teacher she was.

When we were in the grades three, four, and five room, we were fortunate to have another exceptional teacher, Beatrice MacDonald Curran. In grades 7 and 8, we were taught by Hlif Thompson and Wilmer Shynkaruk, both of whom were interested in education. In grade nine, Mr. Lionel Curran juggled three grades, nine, ten, and eleven, and those who studied, did just fine. When I hear teachers who complain about the workload, I like to tell them about Mr. C. Besides, he offered us at least one smile or joke per day.

In 1957, Langruth High School was able to offer grade twelve. There were two teachers for grades ten, eleven and twelve. Mrs. Olive Hall, and Miss Chappel for grade ten, Mrs. Hall and Mr. Mulligan for grade eleven and Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Margie Wilson for grade twelve. Mrs. Hall was a genius with a Math or Science curriculum. Miss Chappel taught both English and Social studies well. Mrs. Wilson was a lifesaver in English and French because we were behind in those subjects. We all excelled in school. Most of us probably would say it is because of Icelandic blood, but an unprejudiced being would say that it was more to do with fine instruction from teachers who taught well in spite of the size of the classes.

We had a wonderful time reminiscing and laughing. At one point, Allan, Brian, and Keith were sharing stories of the things they did in school, but were laughing so hard, they could hardly speak. As we were saying our good-byes after dining at Spotlight Restaurant, Barbara Einarson, mentioned that we had had a wonderful time with no alcohol involved.

Now, we all are seventy-nine years of age. This was our fifth reunion and maybe the last one as there have been deaths and "elder illness" within our group.

# **Song Sparrow**



Even with its drab plumage, this bold songbird is easy to spot when it perches in the open, trilling its pleasant melody. In flight it pumps its tail up and down. Inhabiting a wide range, this bird is found throughout most of North America and is perhaps the continent's most variable species, with approximately thirty-one subspecies recognized.

The Aleutian race, is so large and dark it looks like a different species. Because of the work of an Ohio bird biologist, the biology of this bird may be the best-known of any songbird on the continent. Juveniles are similar to adults but appear bigger overall with finer streaking.

Song Sparrows live in solitary or in pairs. They may be in small loose flocks in winter, often with other species of sparrows. They forage in trees, bushes and on the ground by picking food off foliage, grass, soil. They also scratch the ground to eat insects, larvae, grains, seeds, berries and some fruits. Coastal species take small mollusks and crustaceans. Males sing from exposed perches to claim their territory.

Incubation is 12-14 days by the female. Young altricial are brooded by the female and stay in the next 9-16 days. They are fed by both sexes. There are 2-3 broods per year (occasionally 4 in southern parts of the range).

The Song Sparrow is widespread and abundant to common in brushy areas, thickets, riparian scrub, weedy fields, urban/suburban lawns and forest edges. The species is one of the most frequent victims of parasitism by the Brown-Headed Cowbird.
