Nature Notes

American Coot



This close relative of the gallinules and moorhens lives on open water and is often mistaken for a duck. It pumps its small head back and forth like a chicken when walking or swimming and usually travels and feeds in flocks. A common and widely distributed species over much of North America, the American Coot is easily distinguished by its overall slate-gray plumage, which is blacker on the head and neck, its white bill, and small reddish brown frontal shield. Juveniles are similar to adults but paler, particularly on the underparts, with a darker bill.

The American Coot feeds by immersing its head and neck in shallows with body and tail tipped up. It may also pick food off the surface. It dives 3 – 7.5 metres deep for fronds, leaves, seeds and roots of aquatic plants, which make up most of its diet. This bird also eats insects, amphibians, mollusks and small fish. It runs with wings flapping rapidly to gain flight from water. It is often aggressive towards other waterbirds, chasing them noisily from its vicinity.

During courtship, pairs display for each other on water. The male also chases the female across the surface of the water.

The American Coot's nest is made of dead stems, lined with finer material, floating and anchored to vegetation. It is built by both sexes.

Incubation is 21 - 25 days by both sexes. Precocial young abandon the nest shortly after hatching and dry off. They are tended by both sexes. First flight is at 49 - 56 days. There are one to two broods per year.

The American Coot is common to abundant. The population has decreased in the east in recent years.

What! A Portulaca is a Nutritious Treat?

Yes! The weed Portulaca oleracea that we don't like to see in our gardens can be eaten as a nutritious food instead of being thrown away. It has seven times the beta-carotene of carrots and six times more vitamin E than spinach. much higher levels of Omega 3 fatty acid than other greens. It has significant amounts of fiber, vitamin A, Vitamin C, B vitamins, iron, magnesium, manganese, potassium, calcium and copper. The stems and leaves are good to eat. Wash them thoroughly and cut them up. They can be tossed into a salad or soup, or added to an omelet or a sandwich. It could also be steamed for 4 -5 minutes and seasoned with salt and butter. Juice it or add it to a smoothie. Use your imagination and enjoy!

Finally it is a great way to get rid of a plantars wart. Make it into a paste, put it on a band-aid and cover the wart. Be sure to tape around the band-aid so the portulaca doesn't squeeze out.

For anyone that is feeling under the weather we wish you all a speedy recovery. I know that this type of weather sometimes brings on the flu. According to some weather forecasts we will have a hard, cold winter with lots of snow. Other forecasts say we will have a long, dry fall. That it will be warmer than usual and will be a nice winter. We are going to hope that the second forecast is right! We hope that everyone has a good winter and can enjoy the winter rest.

Having been diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis when only a few months old, Dallas Jonasson (Kory Jonasson's son and Lynne Jonasson's grandson) is no stranger to the Children's Hospital in Winnipeg.

A special person at the Children's Hospital has been David Langdon, the resident therapeutic clown. Through fun and laughter, David Langdon reminds the children that laughter is truly the best medicine. To Dallas's surprise this special clown had a connection to Langruth. He is the grandson of one of the towns founders; George W. Langdon. After Dallas mentioned where he was from, David Langdon told him all about his family and his connection to Langruth.

David Langdon has been making connections with children for 30 years. He took over the therapeutic clown in 1989. Established at the children's hospital in 1986, it was the first clown therapy program in the world. For three decades, his work has given hospitalized children the opportunity to regain hope through interactions with his clown personas. After 30 years behind the makeup, David Langdon is hanging up his red therapy nose.

Dallas was fortunate to have met David Langdon and have fun with his clown personas during his hospital stays. He will be missed.

10 Neat Things About Corn

1. Corn is Grass

Maize, which is the farming name for corn, is a cereal grain. Like most cereal grains, it is from the poaceae family, the grass family.

2. Multiple Varieties

You don't want corn to cross pollinate because it can result in tough corn that isn't very tasty. If you plant varieties that flower at different times you can enjoy a few different kinds.

3. Corn Flowers?

Corn silk is the female flower of corn. The male flower is the tassel up top. Each thread of silk when pollinated grows into a kernel.

4. Corn Needs No Bees

Bees are crucial to agriculture, but not where corn is concerned. Corn pollen is spread by wind, and corn is self-fertile.

5. Save your Energy

Don't bother removing side shoots from our corn plants. It doesn't improve the plant and you may be rewarded with a second ear on some plants.

6. Smut

The white and black fungal gall known as smut is not poisonous. In fact it is a delicacy in Mexico where it is cultivated and fetches a higher price than the corn itself.

7. Feed The Corn That Feeds You

Just like the grass on our lawn, corn appreciates nitrogen. Side-dress your plants with it when they are eight to 12 inches tall.

8. Ready Whether You Are Or Not

Corn is usually ready to harvest about 20 days after the silk appears. If you harvest too early, the juice will be watery. If you harvest too late, the kernels will be tough and doughy.

9. Native Traditions

Corn accounted for up to 65% of the Iroquoian diet and involved the entire community: men cleared an area and women planted.

10. Rascally Racoons

These varmints like their corn just a little less creamy than humans do. Watch out because they'll probably start harvesting before you do.
