



Nature Notes

Black-Crowned Night-Heron



The scientific name of this bird means "Night Raven" and it refers to the nature of the bird, as does the common name of Night-Heron. A stocky bird with short legs and a thick short neck, it prowls freshwater pools, marshes and streams and coastal estuaries across much of North America. In flight the toes often protrude beyond the short tail. Juvenile plumage shows brown above with white spots and streaking, buff-brown below with dark brown spots and streaking. Juveniles have a yellowish bill with a dark tip and greenish yellow legs and feet.

Black-Crowned Night-Herons are primarily nocturnal. They roost in trees by day and actively feed at night. Some feed during daylight hours. They are omnivorous; feeding on whatever is most handy. The diet ranges from fish to mollusks, small rodents, frogs, snakes, crustaceans, plant material, eggs and young birds. They often stand still in water for long periods of time, expertly grabbing fish that swim too close.

The Black-Crowned Night-Heron is monogamous and colonial. The nest is made of sticks, twigs and reeds. It is lined with finer material on or above the ground as high as 46 m. The nest is built by the female with material gathered by the male.

Incubation is 21 - 26 days by both sexes. The first flight is at 42 days. After 49 days the young may follow parents to foraging areas to bed and be fed. There is one brood per year.

The Black-Crowned Night-Heron population is overall stable or increasing. It has benefited from the general protection by the state, federal and conservation agencies. The loss of wetland habitat affects food supply and reproduction.

News From Here, There and Anywhere

Hello again everyone! It is November the 1st and time to let you know what's happening in and around Langruth. I was in the hospital in Portage for a meeting and when I left a lady commented on how cool it was out but then reminded me that it was November. From what I hear the next few days will be cold and blustery. At least we don't have the snow that we got at the beginning of October. Hopefully we will have a reasonable winter again where we don't get too much snow. They are predicting cold and lots of snow so I guess we will have to wait and see what type of winter we get.

How did you make out in the big storm over Thanksgiving weekend? It started out with rain and snow which of course did a great deal of damage. I have been told that we haven't had a storm like that at the beginning of October since 1959. I don't think it was as bad as this year. In the town of Langruth we were out of power for two days and two nights. In the country there were a lot of power lines and power poles down. Some people were out of power for 7 or 8 days. My nurse practitioner asked me if I went somewhere while the power was out to stay warm. I actually didn't even think of it. I just huddled down in my house and put on a few more layers of clothes. It did get a little cold at times. I ended up going to bed quite early because it was nice and cozy in my bed. I read awhile by flashlight and candlelight. It was strange not being able to have anything warm to eat. I had to make do with cold cereal and such. I understand that some people had to get generators to keep their refrigerators and freezers cold. It was quite a storm. We certainly lost a number of trees and branches. There is still a lot of cleaning up yet to do. We hope that you all made out ok and the storm will only be a memory in a little while.

The farmers are having quite a time getting the rest of their harvest finished. I've seen a number of combines out trying to salvage as much as possible before winter sets in. People are short of feed for their livestock. Sadly now that it is so wet out they are unable to make any more feed.

We hope that everyone fares ok this winter.

I hope that everyone got their flu shots at the clinic that was held at the old Municipal Office on October 31st. There were quite a few people there while I was there. Hopefully as many as possible got their shot so we don't get too sick this winter. I know that I keep preaching this ever year. It may not ward off the flu completely but you will have a better chance of fighting it than without the flu shot. You can still get a flu shot at a drug store if you missed the clinic.

Halloween has come and gone of course. I'm not quite sure how many came to my house but there were quite a number of them. I was surprised that they were all finished by about 6:30 pm. They did start around 4:15 pm so I guess that was enough time to get around town. They were all very well-mannered children which very nice costumes.

To everyone that goes away for the winter, we hope that you have a good winter and enjoy your days away. We hope you come back to us in good health to enjoy the summer season with us.

On a recent trip to Portage we saw a lot of deer along the ditches and bush. I didn't realize the deer liked the bean crops as much as they do. I think people will have a good hunting season. In Portage there seems to be a great number of geese. There are crops still out for the geese to feed on. Right now the ground is quite soft so the hunters may have a hard time to get around, but I imagine everything will firm up shortly so they can get out to their usual spots.

You might have heard that I was in the hospital for a few days because I had lost quite a bit of blood. I would like to thank anyone that called or checked up on me with my relatives. I spent three days in the hospital but the doctors couldn't really find anything wrong with me. I am feeling better and stronger so hopefully this won't happen again. I have to see the doctor again to find out if they have figured out more.

I have heard that George Foster has been unwell for quite a long time. He is married to Cathy Cornwell-Foster (formerly Cornwell-Brown). To everyone that has been ill or in the hospital we hope that you have a speedy recovery.

This is the season for the flu so we hope you don't come down with it.

We got a letter in the mail telling us that we have to make arrangements to have our own septic tanks cleaned. I'm sad to say that we are getting less and less service from our municipality and are left to do these things on our own. I'm not sure if this is because of changes to the municipal system or if this is just because we live in the out-lying smaller community. I don't think that we should have to make our own arrangements for septic tank cleaning when it is more efficient to have the whole town cleaned at once.

Our Public Washroom, which was specially built for visitors coming through our community, is now closed. This facility seemed to be used morning, noon and night. Now there always seems to be someone stopping all the time only to find the door locked. Some people are now relieving themselves outside the washroom in our beautiful park. Yet for some reason this facility has been closed by the municipality. It is really too bad that so many of these services are being taken away from our community.

I'm not sure how our snow cleaning will go this winter. I know that many residents rely on having their snow cleared. I hope that service continues and is not lost as well. We will have to wait and see. Many of us can't handle all the snow ourselves.

I received word the other day about a birthday party for Blanche McLeod. She grew up here in Langruth and is Rena Arksey's sister. She was 96 in October and the family had a celebration on November 1st. She now lives at Lions Manor after spending the summer in Gladstone due to renovations at the Manor. We certainly wish her all the best for the coming year.

I know of two other people who had birthdays in October. Just to let you know, I am still two weeks older than my cousin Ernie no matter what he says. My birthday is in the middle of October and his was on October 31st. We hope that anyone else that had a birthday or anniversary in October enjoyed their special day. We hope the coming year will be kind to you also.

I'm sorry to say that I have a number of deaths to report this month. We want to send our

sympathy and condolences to anyone who has lost a family member or friend recently. Ron Jackson passed away during the storm over the Thanksgiving weekend.
