

The annual tree lighting night was once again a wonderful night of community fellowship and a great way to start the Christmas season.




# **Langruth Skating Rink Volunteers Prepare for the 2020 Season**

# Hairy Woodpecker

The Hairy Woodpecker and the Northern Flicker are the two most widely distributed woodpeckers in North America. This woodpecker is found almost anywhere forest exists. Similar in appearance to the smaller Downey Woodpecker, it is noisier but less confiding in humans and does not often allow a close approach before it flies away. This woodpecker sometimes comes for sunflower seeds, nuts, fruit, peanut butter and suet.

Learning its high-pitched peek call note will make this shy bird easier to locate. Look for a white back when the bird is in flight. The only difference between male and female birds is that the female lacks the red occipital patch. Birds in the Pacific Northwest show pale brownish gray underparts.

The Hairy Woodpecker roosts in cavities at night. It feeds primarily on wood-boring insects and their larvae, other insects, nuts, seeds and from the drill wells of sapsuckers. Both sexes drum to advertise the presence and maintain their territory.

Some of these woodpeckers are known to remain with the same mate for at least 4 years.

The nest is 1 - 18 metres above ground and is built by both sexes.

The Hairy Woodpecker has 1 brood per year unless its nest is robbed or disturbed. Incubation is 11-25 days by both sexes (the male at night). The young remain in the nest 28-30 days and are fed by both sexes.

These birds are fairly common but sometimes local over most of their range. They are sometimes more common in the northern hardwood and boreal forests. They are rare in the Deep South and in Florida.

Members of the RCMP were on hand to address citizens' concerns and answer questions on the topic of preventing rural crime.

Event organizer Melissa Bilous says the event was a success.

"I'm very glad that so many people came out this evening. It seems like we had people from the RM of Portage and the RM of Westlake-Gladstone," says Bilous. "There were lots of great questions answered tonight on what we can do to protect ourselves, and stay safe in our small communities."

Topics discussed during the night included knowing your rights, steps you can take to protect your house, and self-defence.

Cst. Larry Neufeld is the Media Liaison Officer for the Portage RCMP and was in attendance. He outlines why this was an important event to hold.

"We want them to understand that in the long run, everything is regarded as public safety. We want everyone to be able to be safe in their own homes, and we want everyone to be comfortable in their own homes. We don't want people being so worried about what's going in the world that they can't enjoy their life at home."

Resident of the community Judy Breckman says it was a good meeting to have.

"We love the community that we live in, and we don't want these people around our community breaking in and doing damage to our properties," says Breckman. "We have to protect our communities for us, and the young people that are living here."
