# **Temporary Office Space for Sandy Bay CFS in Langruth**

Early Sunday, December 15<sup>th</sup> a fire burned down the main building of Sandy Bay Child and Family Services (CFS). Sandy Bay Ojibway First Nation Chief, Lance Roulette, said the structure was totally destroyed. The damage is estimated at \$600.000.00

Sandy Bay fire crews spent about four hours battling the flames, with the assistance of nearby fire departments from Alonsa and Langruth.

Sandy Bay CFS has been using the Langruth Community Hall as a temporary office space. The agency had an emergency contingency plan in place and its execution played a major role in being back in operation very quickly after the disaster. The main priority was to ensure that there was no disruption in family services. CFS director Richard De La Ronde says there has been an outpouring of support from other CFS branches, regional MLAs and MPs.

The next priority now is to finish preparing a number of mobile offices moved into Sandy Bay for on-reserve temporary office space. Sandy Bay CFS was already in the process of building a new office but it will be some time before the agency can move into it.

### **Langruth Fall Supper Report**

Around 255 people enjoyed a lovely turkey and ham dinner complete with a variety of desserts at the Langruth Fall Supper on October 6<sup>th</sup>, 2019. The Fall Supper provides an opportunity for former residents to come back to our community for an event, as well as providing community members an opportunity to work together for a common goal. This is one of the main fundraisers for the Langruth United Church and Grace Lutheran Church. Thank you to everyone who donated, attended and helped in any way. After paying expenses each church received \$1364.15.

### **Nature Notes**

### **Long-Eared Owl**

The most slender and most nocturnal of the large owls is perhaps the most overlooked. It is hard to detect because of its cryptic coloration, shy habits, and the ability to 'freeze' against a perch with body flattened. This owl often uses the same winter perch day after day, resulting in a large accumulation of pellets and droppings beneath it. This tell-tale evidence can be used to locate the roosting owl above. Although the female is larger, both sexes appear similar. This owl frequents a wide range of habitats, from desert oasis to riparian thickets to dense coniferous woodlands.

The Long-Eared Owl is nocturnal. It roosts perched close to the tree trunk in thick cover during the day. It hunts over open fields and marshes feeding on primarily mouse-size mammals and sometimes small birds. This owl is gregarious often on roosts in winter. Accumulated pellet contents can reveal local diet as the undigested bones, teeth and exoskeletons of its prev are compacted within them.

The nesting site is often an abandoned nest of a squirrel, crow, hawk, or heron.

Incubation is 26-28 days by the female. The young stay in the nest for 23-26 days. They are fed by both sexes. There is 1 brood per year.

The Long-Eared Owl is uncommon to locally They may be more common than common. suspected.


I haven't heard how the ice fishing is going this year. We hope that you are catching enough to make it profitable.
