World Day of Prayer




Each year Christians of many cultures, traditions, and races, in

Nature Notes

American Robin

In many areas this bird is considered a sign of spring even though it is a year-round resident in most of its US range. It is among the most common, widely distributed and well-known birds in North America. Commonly seen on lawns, running and stopping to forage and pull earthworms from the ground. It is abundant and widespread in a variety of habitats, including forest, woodlands, gardens and parks.

Juveniles are similar to adults but have heavily spotted underparts and white spotting and edging on the back and shoulders.

American Robins are monogamous and live in solitary or in pairs. They are sometimes observed in loose colonies. They are gregarious after breeding season. In winter they are often in flocks and roost communally with other species. In summer they eat earthworms, insects, and berries. Berries and other fruit are the principal diet in winter.

The nest is made of grasses and mud, with lining of fine grass and is built in all areas of a tree but with shelter from rain. It can also be in a building or on a nest shelf. The female does most of the nest building. The American Robin is defensive of its nesting site and young. It is adapted to human disturbance, especially in agricultural areas and the combination of shade trees and lawns.

Incubation is 12-14 days by the female. Altricial young are brooded by the female. They stay in the nest 14 - 16 days. The female does most of the feeding. The male often tends to the first brood while the female begins to incubate a second clutch. There are 2 - 3 broods per year in the south and fewer in the north.

Langruth Student wins Loran Scholarship

Congratulations to Langruth student Sydney Strocen on winning one of 36 Loran Scholarships of \$100,000. Based on evidence of their character, commitment to community service, and leadership potential 36 Canadians from a pool of 5,194 were selected. The selection of a Loran Scholar is unique in its attention to a young person's character with the belief that integrity, courage, grit and personal autonomy are better indicators of overall potential than standard academic measures. Volunteers interviewed 545 semi-finalists and then invited 88 finalists to their National Selections on January 31st and February 1st in Ontario. The 36 Loran Scholars were interviewed or assessed by up to 12 different people over the course of three months.

Loran Scholarship Foundation partners with 25 Canadian Universities. Each Loran Award is valued at up to \$100,000 over four years of undergraduate study. The award also includes an annual stipend and matching tuition waiver, access to funding for summer internships, oneone-one mentorship, and annual retreats and scholar gatherings.

Sydney attended Langruth Elementary School and then continued onto WMCI in Gladstone for high school. Sydney has served as treasurer of the WMCI Student Council for the last two years. She is a member of the WMCI environmental and social justice groups. Sydney also volunteers at the Manitoba Museum and the Canadian Museum for Human Rights.

Best of luck to Sydney in her future studies and endeavors.

KAP Rural Connectivity Survey

Keystone Agricultural Producers (KAP), the voice of farmers in Manitoba, has launched a rural connectivity survey aimed at better understanding the issues facing both cellular coverage and broadband access across the province.

"Our members are some of the most poorly served by telecommunications in Canada because they live and run their businesses in rural areas with limited population density," KAP director Sam Connery-Nichol said. "Rural Manitobans are missing out on key information, including emergency alerts, and are often unable to call for help due to a lack of cell coverage."

KAP has been advocating for years for improved broadband service in rural areas. Agriculture is a primary economic driver provincially and nationally. However, a lack of access to reliable, affordable broadband internet prevents farmers from being able to take advantage of technological advances that would ultimately make their operations more successful.
