Coronaviruses can cause illness in humans and in animals. Common coronaviruses that infect humans usually cause mild symptoms similar to the common cold. COVID-19 is a new strain of the virus identified in humans. The World Health Organization has assessed the outbreak of COVID-19 and considering the alarming levels of spread and severity COVID-19 has been characterized as a pandemic.

Symptoms range from mild (fever, cough, runny nose, sore throat) to severe (shortness of breath and breathing difficulties). Older people and those with chronic health conditions appear to be more vulnerable to becoming severely ill.

The COVID-19 virus is spread through close contact (within 2 meters/ 6 feet) with an infected person who is coughing or sneezing. The virus spreads primarily through droplets of saliva or discharge from the nose when an infected person coughs or sneezes. You can also get COVID-19 by touching objects contaminated with the virus and then touching your mouth, eyes or nose.

People are encouraged to take preventative measures, including regular hand washing with soap and water for at least 15 seconds. An alcohol based hand cleanser can also be used if your hands are not visibly dirty. Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing and sneezing, or cough or sneeze into your sleeve. Avoid sharing household and personal care items. After use of these items, wash them thoroughly with soap and warm water, place in the dishwasher for cleaning or, wash in your washing machine.

Along with these preventative measures, practices such as social and physical distancing, self-quarantine and isolation when appropriate can slow the rate of infection. Social distancing is deliberately increasing the physical space between people to avoid spreading illness. Staying at least six feet away from other people lessens your chances of contracting COVID-19.

At this time, there is no vaccine to prevent the spread of COVID-19. There are no specific treatments for coronavirus illnesses. If you have symptoms of COVID-19 you should call Health Links–Info Santé, who will provide health advice. Currently there are 16 testing sites in Manitoba, including seven drive-thru locations. The testing sites are not walk-in clinics, a referral is required.

The pandemic can seem overwhelming, but every person can help slow down the spread of COVID-19. By doing your part, you can make a big difference to your health, and that of others around you. Take care and stay safe.

#### Manitoba Government Declares State of Emergency

The Manitoba Government declared a province wide State of Emergency on March 20<sup>th</sup> to protect the public and reduce the spread of COVID-19.

Premier Brian Pallister said, "We must continue to use every tool available to 'flatten the curve' and reduce the spread of COVID-19. Our government is focused solely on the health and safety of all Manitobans. This move will enable us to react more quickly on a broad range of supportive measures to stop the spread of COVID-19 and ensure that essential services are available for all Manitobans during this global health pandemic."

In addition, the chief provincial public health officer issued orders under The Public Health Act as approved by the minister of health, seniors and active living. "With this declaration, the biggest role for all Manitobans to play right now, is to protect yourself, your family, your friends and your community," said Dr. Brent Roussin, chief provincial public health officer. "I cannot emphasize this enough – this is the time for action. We must change our day-to-day lives, and think about your role in protecting ourselves and all Manitobans."

Pallister also continued, "The situation is constantly evolving and changing rapidly. Enacting a state of emergency will further our province's ability to be nimble, act swiftly and support Manitobans when they need it most."

#### **Operation of Non-Critical Businesses** Restricted

On March 30<sup>th</sup> The Manitoba government issued a new public health order to reduce the spread of COVID-19 and protect the health and safety of all Manitobans.

The following measures have been in place as of Wednesday, April 1<sup>st</sup>:

- Public gatherings are limited to no more than 10 people at any indoor or outdoor place or premises. This includes places of worship, gatherings and family events such as weddings and funerals. This does not apply to a facility where health care or social services are provided.
- All restaurants and other commercial facilities • that serve food are prohibited from serving food to customers in their premises. Restaurants and other commercial facilities can prepare and service for delivery or takeout.
- All businesses that are not listed in the • schedule of critical services must close between April 1st and April 14th. This closure order does not prevent these businesses from operating on a remote basis.
- All businesses listed in the schedule of critical services may continue to operate. Business operators must ensure appropriate social distancing rules are followed.
- Municipal transit services, taxis and other private vehicles for hire can continue to operate. The operator must ensure appropriate social distancing rules are followed.

"We are seeing what is happening in other jurisdictions, and the time to act is now. We must continue to adapt to the situation and change our day-to-day lives to prevent unnecessary illness and further tragedies in Manitoba," said Dr. Brent provincial Roussin, chief public health officer. "These measures will help us reduce the risk and protect all Manitobans during the ongoing pandemic."


The premier also noted that the state of emergency to enable the province to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic remains in effect.

reduced dusky hood covering its eye and reaching from mid-crown to nape. In flight, it differs from the similar Laughing Gull by a white bar and large white tips on primaries and a paler surface on the under wing primaries.

The Franklin's Gull is gregarious. It is terrestrial in summer and winters on the Pacific Ocean from Central America southward.

It forages for food while walking, wading or swimming, sometimes spotting prey while hovering over water. This gull eats insects, fish, leeches, earthworms, crustaceans and snails. It sometimes catches insects while flying. It attends agricultural cultivating machinery taking exposed prev.

The nests are lined with bulrushes, cattails and other plant material. They are built by both sexes.

Incubation is 18-25 days by both sexes. The young are fed by both sexes. Their first flight is at 32-35 days. They have 1 brood per year.

The Franklin's Gull is common in its breeding range but local population often fluctuates due to rainfall and drought patterns. They are rare in migration on both coasts. There has been some loss of nesting habitat due to agricultural practices.



The families buried their family members all together because it was happening so fast. I've heard that elderly people are most susceptible but there are cases of people of all ages who have contracted it and died. I think there is still a lot to learn about the patterns of this virus.

During the storm it was snowing so hard I couldn't see across the street. We certainly didn't need that at this time of year. If we aren't going to have the snow in the winter maybe we just don't need it at all. We can just go without snow and have rain instead. I suppose the snowmobilers might have wanted more snow but I think we can just get on with it and get spring started.

Have you noticed how many birds we have around lately? We have all kinds of robins, chickadees and a number of crows (I don't know why there are so many crows). Out by the lake there are some geese around now that it is starting to melt. The snow has caused the little birds around my place some trouble. They seem to fly this way and then that way. I think they are just trying to find food and shelter from the snow. The robins and chickadees seem like they are in good shape but it might be that their feathers are all fluffed up. I don't know that they can be that fat at this time of year.

I have been watching the re-runs of curling lately. I don't remember all the shots so it is all new to me. I do know that I have seen the Canadians and the Swedes play a couple times now. Who knows maybe this is the third time. There really isn't a great deal to watch right now so this is something to pass the time. I do watch horse racing on Saturdays. #### Manitoba Suspends Classroom Learning Indefinitely Amid COVID-19 Pandemic

At the advice of the chief provincial public health office to help 'flatten the curve' and reduce the impact of COVID-19, Manitoba suspended classroom learning for kindergarten to Grade 12 students indefinitely for this school year on March 31<sup>st</sup>.

Premier Brian Pallister reiterated, "We must do everything we can to flatten the COVID curve and protect the health and well-being of all Manitobans. The decision to suspend classroom learning was the easiest decision to make because it protects our children and their education – it is the right thing to do."

No student will be held back due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but students must actively engage in learning. All students on tract to graduate will do so. Teachers will teach remotely, assign work, conduct assessments and prepare final report cards. For students in Grade 12, provincial exams will be cancelled, but teacher assessments will be implemented. For students in early and middle year, provincial assessments are complete for the current school year, but other assessments will continue.

Education minister Kelvin Goertzen recognized the work of Manitoba teachers saying, "The efforts and success Manitoba teachers and educators have displayed during this public health pandemic have been inspiring. I join all Manitobans in asking educators to continue doing all they can to use remote and innovative methods to teach students through the remainder of this school year. Our government is asking for an allhands-on-deck approach, with the assistance of parents, caregivers, principals, trustees and superintendents for the benefit of all students."

The overall plan is oriented toward the future and we will learn how to modernize education through our response to this situation, Goertzen said. The combined efforts are geared toward the reopening of classrooms, as well as toward multifaceted ways to teach and to learn after COVID-19, he added.

With the annual spring run-off approaching, the province continues to watch waterways in anticipation of potential high-water situations.

Infrastructure Minister Ron Schuler said, "The focus continues to be on the Red River this spring. Forecasters are expecting a significant inflow of water from the northern United States and they expect high water levels similar to last spring.

The latest Spring Thaw Outlook reports the Assiniboine River basin and other rivers are expected to remain mostly in-bank, with possible over-bank high water covering agricultural land at a few locations.

Both have been remanded into custody and were due to appear in court March 17th. The investigation continues.
