Nature Notes

American Redstart



Birders enjoy watching this vivacious bird as it flits to catch insects or sits on a perch, partially spreading and drooping its wings and spreading its tail. Other warblers pump or flick their tails, but this bird fans its tail and holds it there for a second. The male's tail can be either orange and black or yellow and dusky olive-gray. This woodland inhabitant is one of the most common warblers nesting in North America. Juvenile males look like females but with an orange wash on the sides.

The American Redstart lives in solitary or in pairs. It is tame, conspicuous and sings often. It responds to squeaking or pishing by birders. The American Redstart sallies into the air to catch insects, perching between hawking events like a small flycatcher. It gleans food from branches and foliages. It sometimes hover-gleans eating insects, caterpillars, spiders, berries, fruit and seeds.

The nest is made of grasses, pieces of bark, rootlets and plant down decorated with lichen, birch bark and spider's silk and lined with feathers. The nest is built by the female in the fork of a tree or bush, usually 3-6 metres above ground (but ranges 4-21 metres above ground).

Incubation is about 11-12 days by the female. Altricial young are brooded by the female. They stay in the nest 9 days and are fed by both sexes. They have 1 brood per year.

The American Redstart is common to fairly common in wet deciduous and mixed conifer-deciduous woodlands with understory, woodlands edges, riparian woodland and second growth.

They are widespread but declining in the Midwest, Great Lakes, the Northeast and the Maritime Provinces.

This bird is a common cowbird host. It is vulnerable to habitat loss caused by deforestation of second-growth forests.



COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

June 30th marked six months since the World Health Organization (WHO) received the first reports of cases of pneumonia of unknown cause in China. The six month anniversary coincides with reaching 10 million cases and 500,000 deaths world-wide. This is a moment to reflect on the progress made and the lessons learned and to recommit ourselves to doing everything we can to save lives. No one could have imagined how our world could be affected by this new virus.

All over the world we have seen heartwarming acts of resilience, inventiveness, solidarity and kindness. But we have also seen concerning signs of stigma, misinformation and the politicization of the pandemic. For the past six months, WHO has worked relentlessly to support all countries to prepare for and respond to this new virus.

Although a vaccine will be an important longterm tool for controlling COVID-19, there are five priorities that every single country must focus on. First, empower communities. Every individual must understand that they are not helpless – there are things they should do to protect themselves and others. That includes physical distancing, hand hygiene, covering coughs, staying home when ill and wearing masks when appropriate. Second, suppress transmission. There are steps that all countries can take to suppress the spread of the virus. The single-most important intervention is tracing and quarantining contacts. Third, save lives. Early identification and clinical care saves lives. Fourth, accelerate research. There is still a lot to learn about this virus. And fifth, political leadership. National unity and global solidarity are essential to suppress transmission, save lives and minimize the social and economic impact.

WHO will continue to serve countries with science, solidarity and solutions. The critical question that all countries will face in the coming months is how to live with this virus. That is the

new normal. Although many countries have made progress, globally the pandemic is speeding up.

In Manitoba the number of COVID-19 cases reached 325 on July 1st. Phase 3 of the plan to further ease public health restrictions and safely restoring services came into effect on June 21st.

Phase 3 was based on public health advice, consultation with key sectors and feedback from the public. Some of the key changes were public gatherings of 50 people are allowed indoors and 100 people outdoors where a separation of at least two metres, except for brief exchanges, can be maintained. Anyone entering Manitoba from western Canada or Northwestern Ontario is not required to self-isolate for 14 days if they are asymptomatic and have no known exposure to COVID-19. Travelers from all other Canadian iurisdictions will need to continue to self-isolate for 14 days after arriving in Manitoba. Restaurants may fully operate if a separation of at least two metres can be maintained between patrons, except for brief exchanges.

As businesses and communities expand the services they offer all Manitobans must continue to practice physical distancing with others outside their households, wash their hands often and stay home when they are feeling ill.

Manitoba is also planning the return to in-class learning in September for all students while continuing to follow public health advice. This means the K-12 system must be ready to adapt to changing public health conditions at any time.

While we can take pride in the progress made, Manitobans must remain vigilant


