

Big Grass Marsh Important Bird Area

Big Grass Marsh is located just west of the town of Langruth. It is a low-lying, flat area that consists of a large marsh, surrounded by community pastures and agricultural land. The marsh includes Jackfish, Seagull and Chandler lakes and a variety of habitats: remnants of tall-grass prairie, wooded areas, willow scrub, and man-made drainage ditches and dykes.

During spring and fall migration, tens of thousands of ducks and geese, including Canada and Snow geese, regularly use Big Grass Marsh. Some have described this area as one of the most important waterfowl staging areas on the continent. As many as 200,000 migrating Snow Geese have used the area in spring and fall. Canada Geese (Tall Grass Prairie and Eastern Prairie populations) are also abundant in both spring and fall. Thousands of puddle and bay ducks pass through or stay for longer to moult or stage. Mallards are the most common with over 10,000 occasionally reported. Included among the 16 other duck species found here are: Northern Pintail, Gadwall, Northern Shoveler, Redhead, Ruddy Duck and Ring-necked Duck. Many of the migrant ducks also breed at Big Grass Marsh.

Wilson's Phalarope



Phalaropes have devised a terrific way to get plankton and other food to the water's surface for harvest. They spin like tops, as fast as 60 times per minute, creating small whirlpools that pull food to the surface where they can pick it up with their long slender bills.

In flight, wings lack stripping, and uppertail coverts are white. This is the only phalarope confined to inland habitats and restricted to the Western Hemisphere.

This bird is tame and lives in solitary, pairs or small flocks. It eats insects, larvae, crustraceans, and marsh plant seeds. It probes mud in shallow water, sometimes with head submerged. It spins and dabbles. It can be seen following shoveler ducks to pick stirred-up prey from the surface. This bird also sometimes snags insects from the air or often walks in vegetation, picking prey from the ground and plants.

Females court males by swimming beside them chasing off other females, eventually making sexual advances. Males develop incubation patches.

The nest is lined with grass. The female starts building the nest but it is mostly built by the male.

Incubation is about 18-21 days by the male. Young leave the nest the day of hatching. They are tended to by the male but feed themselves. The first flight is at 16-18 days. They have 1 or more broods per year.

The Wilson's Phalarope is common in the west although declining slightly. They are uncommon to rare or casual in the east. Draining of marshes has caused loss of nesting areas. Protection of such areas is needed.

COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

The Emergency Committee on COVID-19, convened by the World Health Organization (WHO), held its fourth meeting on July 31st. The lengthy duration of the COVID-19 pandemic, noting the importance of sustained community, national, regional, and global response efforts was highlighted. The Committee unanimously agreed that the outbreak still constitutes a public health emergency of international concern.

The pandemic is a once-in-a-century health crisis, the effects of which will be felt for decades to come. Many countries that believed they were past the worst are now grappling with new outbreaks. Some that were less affected in the earliest weeks are now seeing escalating numbers of cases and deaths. And some that had large outbreaks have brought them under control.

The Emergency Committee made a range of recommendations for COVID-19 preparedness and response, to maintain health services, while accelerating the research and eventual access to vaccines. The committee advised countries to support research efforts while strengthening public health surveillance for case identification and contact tracing and to maintain essential health services with sufficient funding, supplies, and human resources.

Countries were advised implement to appropriate travel advice, based on risk assessments, and to review these measures regularly.

In Manitoba, the province announced on July 23rd that the plans for the fourth phase of the *Restoring Safe Services* roadmap would be adjusted. "As we move through this pandemic, our number one priority is to ensure the health and well-being of all Manitobans," said Cameron Friesen, Health, Seniors and Active Living Minister. "While Manitoba's response to COVID-19 has been led by scientific evidence and the

advice of our public health professionals, feedback from Manitobans regarding what they are ready to accept and support at each phase of recovery has been considered."

Phase Four came into effect on July 25th with some items proceeding as planned but with other items deferred to a later date.

Phase Four included increased visitation at personal care homes and long-term care settings. A balanced approach to visitation is required which mitigates risk of COVID-19 transmission while minimizing the risks of isolation brought on by strict visitation restrictions.

Faith-Based and Cultural Gatherings site capacity is now a maximum of 30% or 500 people, whichever is lower. Stage performances and movie theatres reopened at a capacity of 30% or 500 people, whichever is lower. Casinos also were allowed to reopen with occupancy of 30%. Retail businesses and indoor recreations sites are now allowed to use non-permeable barriers when distances of two metres cannot be maintained.

The following proposed changes were deferred:

- changes to indoor & outdoor gathering sizes;
- relaxing of self-isolation requirements for those travelling from eastern and southern Ontario, Quebec and Atlantic Canada; and
- walk-up counter service in bars, beverage rooms, brew pubs, microbreweries and distilleries.

Public health officials will continue to look to the data and engage with Manitobans to ensure we are taking a balanced approach as we learn how we can live with this virus in the weeks, months and years ahead.

Manitoba Classroom Learning to Resume in September

Education Minister Kelvin Goertzen announced on July 30th that classroom learning will resume on September 8th for all Manitoba students in kindergarten through Grade 12 following last spring's suspension caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"The province is welcoming students back to classrooms for the new school year, while working closely with school divisions and Public Health," said Goertzen. "The best place for students is in class, giving them the full benefits of the tremendous work of Manitoba teachers and providing parents and caregivers with certainty that their children are receiving the best education possible."

The Welcoming Our Students Back: Restoring Safe Schools guidelines have been developed in collaboration with the province's kindergarten to Grade 12 COVID-19 response planning team, as well as with school divisions and public health officials. Manitoba school divisions and schools will follow these provincial guidelines to finalize and post division plans by mid-August. Accessible and transparent information is important as students, staff and families will have questions about returning to in-class learning.

Learning in classrooms will be full-time for students in kindergarten through Grade 8 and for special-needs students in all grades. Some remote learning may be required for students in grades 9 to 12, based on the ability of high schools to implement necessary public health measures including physical distancing and the use of cohorts (designated groups of students) to minimize the risk of COVID-19 transmission, and to support contact tracing.

Three response levels have been developed to ensure that school divisions and schools are prepared for in-class learning based on public health advice. Divisions must ensure that all students learning remotely have access to technology.

"Manitoba Education and Public Health are working with divisions and individual schools to ensure that as many students as possible return to classroom learning full-time," said Goertzen. "Divisions have been working diligently this summer on their individual plans for September, and are refining details for communication, screening, hand hygiene, physical distancing, the use of cohorts and outbreak management to be followed at every one of their schools."

A total of \$48 million in savings is available to ensure that schools are COVID-ready in September, the minister noted, adding the province is monitoring resource implications closely as part of its planning to ensure the safe return to classroom instruction in the upcoming school year.

"The need for child care is top of mind. The departments of Education and Families are working with school divisions and the child-care sector to ensure that families can continue to access child care within schools," said Goertzen. "Both departments are working together to develop learning guidelines for children with special needs, as well as students at risk."

Welcoming Our Students Back: Restoring Safe Schools is based on feedback provided by parents, caregivers, students and education stakeholders through an EngageMB survey that began in June. The minister noted tens of thousands of Manitobans have completed the survey, and the government will continue to collect and use this information in adapting plans while the public health situation evolves. Manitobans can visit https://engagemb.ca to share thoughts or ask questions.

In a joint statement, the Manitoba School Boards Association, the Manitoba Teachers' Society, Manitoba Federation of Independent Manitoba Association of School Schools, Business Officials and the Manitoba Association of School Superintendents said, "We believe that collaborative planning is in the best interests of students, parents, and school staff. The goal is to have as many students as possible learning in classrooms this fall and throughout the coming school year. Maintaining a strong focus on the health, safety and well-being of students, staff, families and communities, we all agree the emphasis needs to be on getting students the inperson teaching and learning they need while making sure that safety is the top priority for everyone."

A Gift to Share From the Caspian Sea

Last month I received an unexpected gift from our daughter Heather, Caspian Sea yogurt culture. Yummy!



Heather and her husband Tyler were able to bring it with them from Alberta as the fourteen day self-isolation restriction for individuals coming from Alberta to Manitoba had being lifted. Hurray! We got to see Heather and Tyler and received a gift we could share.

I have made yogurt from thermophilic cultures that you had to heat and it was a long drawn out procedure without a yogurt maker. However this culture was different it was mesophilic which doesn't need heating.

It is wonderfully easy to make. Using a sterilized jar and tablespoon, simply place 1 tablespoon of Caspian Sea yogurt culture into 1 cup of milk and stir. Increase amount for a larger Top with a coffee filter and elastic band and set aside from other fermented cultures/foods, so the cultures do not mix, for 8 to 12 hours in your cupboard or on a counter. To check for thickness tilt the jar to determine if you need to give it more time for it to become thicker and more solid or the consistency you like. I let it set for 12 hours. However, the higher the temperature in the room the faster it sets. I use 3.25% milk and sometimes add some ½ and ½ cream to make it richer. I like it rich and creamy. Experiment according to your own milk preferences and taste. The texture is a bit different than regular yogurt.

During these Covid times when you might run out of yogurt, don't stress, instead smile and relax and say I can make some right now.

I am willing to gift some of my Caspian Sea mesophilic culture to others and hopefully you will like it and gift some to others too. Give me a call at 204-445-2323 or email me at thordarsonhealth@gmail.com to arrange to pick some up.
