Since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has commemorated the Great Chicago Fire of October 1871. The tragic blaze lasted two days – Oct. 8 and 9 – burning more than 800 hectares, killing more than 250 people and leaving 100,000 homeless.

This year Fire Prevention Week takes place from October 4th to 10th with the theme "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!" Fire Prevention Week is a great opportunity for children and adults to talk about fire safety. Whether it's practicing fire drills at home or at school or taking some time in the kitchen to point out potential hazards we can all do our part in preventing fire emergencies and preparing for the possibility of a fire emergency.

Firefighters provide lifesaving public education in an effort to decrease casualties caused by fires. Many resources can be found on line on the National Fire Protection Association web site (https://www.nfpa.org/Public-Education/Stayingsafe/Preparedness/Fire-Prevention-Week).

Fire Prevention Week is also a time where the dedication of local volunteer fire fighters can be recognized. Nature Notes

Ovenbird

In the leaf litter under tall deciduous trees, the female Ovenbird builds a small oven-shaped nest with a side entrance. Unlike many warblers, it does not often forage in live vegetation. Instead it walks on the ground, foraging among the leaf litter and twigs, its head partially dropped and its tail upward, sometimes quickly raised and slowly lowered. The Ovenbird is sometimes called the Wood Wagtail because it moves its tail up and down.

Most singing is done from an elevated perch, and the song of one territorial male initiates a response song from each neighbor, which in turn stimulates another to do so until a wave of Ovenbird song sweeps across the woodlot. This bird is more often heard than seen.

The nest is made of leaves, grasses, stems, rootlets, mosses and hair on the ground of the forest making a dome. It is concealed by leaves on top of the nest. The nest is built by the female.

Incubation is 11 - 14 days by the female. Young altricial are brooded by the female and remain in the nest 8 - 11 days. They are fed by both sexes. There are 1 - 2 broods per year (occasionally 3 in regions with spruce budworm outbreaks).

The Ovenbird is common to fairly common in mature deciduous forest, rarely in pine forest. They are rare in the west of the Rockies in migration. They are also rare to casual on the southern Atlantic Coast and Gulf Coast in winter.

The Ovenbird is a host to cowbird parasitism. A significant decline in population has been documented in the northeast beginning in the 1970s but now increasing in much of its range. This is a migratory species.

The World Health Organization (WHO) reports that the world is still grappling with the COVID-19 pandemic. Approximately 2 million cases are added each week. In passing the tragic milestone of 1 million deaths, we mourn the loss of so many.

At the same time, WHO continues to support all countries to prevent infections and save lives. Some countries jumped on the virus quickly and have avoided large outbreaks. Some countries have had large outbreaks but were able to bring them under control. Other countries brought the virus under control but as economies and societies have eased restrictions have seen an increase in cases. Finally, there are still countries that are in the intense phase of transmission.

With strong leadership, clear strategies, consistent communication, and an engaged, empowered and enabled population, it's never too late to turn the tide. Countries in every region have been able to develop a collective blueprint for suppressing the virus and work to save both lives and livelihoods.

WHO will continue to support national action plans through our regional and national country offices and spread these lessons of success across the globe. WHO urges every single leader to strengthen their response, put targeted measures in place that we know can suppress the spread, ensure that health systems and workers are protected, and saves lives.

If we all keep doing the basics: physical distancing, hand washing, mask wearing, coughing and sneezing safely, avoiding crowds and keeping windows and doors open when you can't meet friends and family outside – together, we will suppress this virus. It's important for governments to stay vigilant and keep investing in national health systems including contact tracing. As a united front we will be able to put the COVID-19 pandemic behind us.

With case numbers on the rise in Manitoba, the Health Canada COVID Alert app can help warn people of a possible exposure to COVID-19. The app is now available to Manitoba residents and builds on our public health contact tracing efforts to inform people of possible exposures.

The COVID Alert app uses Bluetooth technology to detect when users are near each other. Someone who tests positive for COVID-19 will be provided a one-time key from public health. By entering the key into the app, it will notify other app users who have been within two metres of a person who has tested positive for COVID-19 for at least 15 minutes over a 24-hour period within the last 14 days. Subscribers who receive this exposure alert can then assess their risk and seek testing, if needed. The COVID Alert app does not collect personal information or health data, and does not track the location, name, address or contacts of any user. All aspects of the app are completely voluntary.

It is still important to remember to focus on the fundamentals to reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 especially during fall holidays and celebrations. At this time, Manitoba families are encouraged to reduce the number of close contacts outside of their households, and avoid closed-in or crowded spaces. Manitobans are encouraged to wear a mask in indoor spaces where physical distancing between family groups is difficult. Lists of those attending gatherings should be retained for 21 days to ensure appropriate public health follow-up can take place if a COVID-19 exposure occurs.

Well here I am again. One more month of summer has come to an end. It has been hot and cold this last little while. We also had some rain – not a lot but every little bit counts right now. We will need some rain to get through the winter season. I heard that areas north are starting to get snow flurries. I guess snow is bound to fall one of these days here too. I don't have a lot of news because there still isn't a lot going on due to the pandemic. Everything in the newspapers and on television and radio is about the COVID news and how many cases there are. I hear that there are places in Quebec and other parts of Canada that are still pretty much closed down to stop the spread of the virus. We certainly hope that a cure for this virus is found soon. I heard that there are two cases of COVID virus in Gladstone. Apparently they are not terribly ill but they still have the virus. People that had been in close contact have been asked to take COVID tests. One of the staff here had to have her children tested. Apparently there are long waits at the testing sites. The Portage testing site was so busy she went to Brandon for a test. The test is quick but getting the results takes a few days. Hopefully we can get back to our old ways before too long so we can get together with family and friends again.

Here at Centennial Apartments the coffee room has been shut down again due to the virus. Apparently this is the second time. We need to make sure we are following the safety protocol by taking our own cups and letting the staff serve us. We are not to touch anything in the room to prevent the possible spread of the virus. It is a very strict situation that must be abided by if the coffee room is to be open.

There have been so many events cancelled due to the pandemic. We will just have to wait this out. Thanksgiving is coming and many families usually get together before winter sets in. I don't know how many families will spend Thanksgiving together. It is probably best to keep with our immediate family groups this year. One of the staff members here said that she has a turkey but doesn't know if she will have her family for dinner. She would only be able to have 10 people and they would have to be spaced out. She doesn't really have the room for that. We hope that everyone enjoys their Thanksgiving as best they can and stays healthy.

I have been told that the second wave of the virus is coming so we have to be prepared to stay home and to limit contact with others. We will probably need to have our groceries and mail delivered like we did earlier this year. Those in the country have to find someone who can bring groceries out. It is a lot to deal with.

The Flu Shot Clinics will be starting soon. There will be extra precautions in place this year. Masks will be required and if there are too many people there at once you might have to wait in your vehicle. Loreley Fehr, Public Health Nurse, has tentatively scheduled a Flu Clinic on November 3rd in Langruth. Watch for more details. It is important to get a flu shot because it will help with the COVID virus as well.

Unfortunately the Langruth United Church and Grace Lutheran Church cancelled their Fall Supper for this year. Buffet meals are not permitted at this time. Many people enjoyed coming to this supper every year and it was one of the church's main fundraisers. In Gladstone the Fall Supper will go ahead but it will be delivery or take-out only. I'm not sure how this will work but they are going to give it a try.

We do have some meals at Centennial Apartments but they are prepared and delivered to our rooms. It isn't the same as getting together with other people but we are still able to enjoy a good meal.

I also noticed that the Annual Game & Fish Supper Banquet is cancelled for this year as well. The Kinosota Game and Fish Association will have an Awards Night but it will be done virtually. The entries will be either be brought in, mailed in, or e-mailed in ahead of time and then the judges will make their selections. As with everything, there are a lot of changes. It is nice to see that the committee has found a way to continue with awards night tradition.

I'm sure the Christmas season will look a lot different as well. Time will tell what will happen with all the seasonal concerts and events. No one wants to see someone get sick at an event.

I had a phone visit with Rena Arksey the other day. She told me that her sister Louise Groom had a fall recently. She has some cracked ribs and is now in the hospital at Seven Oaks in Winnipeg. She obviously can't have visitors in the hospital but I'm sure she would enjoy a note or card in the mail. Rena also told me that Sylvia Huyber's sister from Alberta was here for a week or so. I'm sure the Huyber family enjoyed the visit after not being able to see people from a long distance away for so long. 6 Pianos at Nuit Blanche

This tumultuous year has had a profound effect on musicians. The lockdown resulted in thousands of cancelled gigs and turned live music into a rare and precious opportunity. So, when my friends Maddy Hildebrand and Everett Hopfner emailed with an idea for a performance, I jumped at the chance. Their idea was not a small one: 6 pianos, 6 pianists, and the opportunity to connect with hundreds of potential audience members over the course of one night.

Nuit Blanche is a celebration of art, music, and creativity which takes place every fall in Winnipeg's downtown. This year's event was especially anticipated, as outdoor gatherings had been deemed society's safest option for musical meetings. We applied for funding, acquired music, rented keyboards, and started practicing for the big day. We even joined up with a wonderful lighting designer, Andy Rudolph, to help illuminate our *6 Pianos* project.

Our aim? To unite musicians and audiences in a creative space, a welcome relief as concert stages have been rendered (mostly) silent. The core of this project was a performance of hypnotic, minimalist music written for 6 pianos, played by myself, Maddy, Everett, Lisa Rumpel, Darryl Friesen, and Naomi Woo. This rarely heard ensemble represents an unusual mass collective effort, not unlike the struggle we currently face against COVID19 - each performance requires individual accountability and collective care in order to succeed.

We had one rehearsal outdoors, with great success and many laughs. On the eve of our second rehearsal, two days before the event, *Nuit*



Blanche broke the news: due to rising COVID19 numbers, our planned Saturday performance would not be possible.

As they say, those who adapt, survive! In an incredible 24-hour whirlwind of favours, flexibility, and generosity, a new plan was formed: we would record a video to share widely. A wonderful videographer (Julie Epp) and a fantastic recording engineer (Joe Dudych) jumped on board, and Ed and Millie Hildebrand's riverside backyard became our new concert stage.

We couldn't have made this happen without the support of Nuit Blanche, the Women's Musical Club of Winnipeg, Virtuosi Concerts, Long and McQuade, Videopool, the Hildebrand family, and all those who donated at our open rehearsal.
