# **Cyber Fraud Attacks Municipality**

On October 12<sup>th</sup> the Municipality of Westlake-Gladstone informed taxpayers of a cyber-attack, in which money was electronically stolen from the municipality's operating bank account.

Between December 19, 2019 and January 5, 2020, 47 electronic withdrawals in the amount of approximately \$9950 were made. The total loss was approximately \$447 000.

The discovery of the missing funds, on January 6, 2020, was acted upon immediately by CAO, Coralie Smith, who contacted Stride Credit Union, the RCMP and council to report the theft.

National security experts have been hired to review the computer logs of both the Municipality and Stride Credit Union. Initial investigations have determined that the funds were sent to an account in Toronto before being sent out of the country. The investigation is ongoing.

The Municipality has made an insurance claim to cover this loss but was denied. The Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) has worked with the insurance provider to ensure coverage for cyber fraud. AMM has offered assistance with legal fees to address this matter.

Stride Credit Union reports that it continuously monitors the digital banking system to minimize these types of cyber-fraud events and to keep its members' privacy and money safe. Stride Credit Union is working with the municipality and IT experts to help determine how the funds were withdrawn.

Council and staff are working with experts that they feel will lead to the recovery of the missing funds. As of November 3<sup>rd</sup> the municipality has not released any new information to the public.

### **Nature Notes**

### **Common Grackle**

This gregarious bird has expanded its range by adapting to suburban areas. Outside the nesting season, noisy groups roost together at night, often with other species. Juveniles are sooty brown with dark brown eyes.

The Common Grackle is conspicuous. It nests, forages and roosts in groups or flocks all year. Large post nesting season flocks can damage crops and winter flocks may number in the hundreds of thousands. This bird walks on the ground and forages in trees, shrubs, grass and croplands. It may wade into water. The diet consists of insects, worms, caterpillars, fruits, grains, seeds, small rodents, small fish, salamanders, and eggs and nestlings of other birds.

The male displays by fluffing out his shoulder feathers to make a ruffled collar, drooping his wings and singing.

The nest is a bulky mass of stems, sticks, grasses and seaweed with a mud lining. It has a softer lining of feathers, grasses and bits of debris. The nest is high in a tree, in a shrub, set in the marsh, in the hollow of an old tree, under the eave of a building or among highway plantings. It is usually 60 cm to 4 m above the ground (sometimes up to 30.5 m above the ground). The nest is built by the female.

The Common Grackle is monogamous. Some males are polygamous. They are colonial.

Incubation is 13 - 14 days by the female. Young stay in the nest 16-20 days. They are fed by both sexes. There are 1 - 2 broods per year.

The Common Grackle is abundant and widespread in open areas with scattered trees, open woodlands, agricultural areas, parks and around human habitation.

They are a rare host to cowbird parasitism. The birds feed on crops, making a nuisance in large winter roosts. Sometimes the crops are destroyed.

# COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

The COVID-19 pandemic is still a public health emergency of international concern. As of October 30<sup>th</sup> over 1.1 million people have lost their lives to COVID-19. As the spread of the virus accelerates, the International Health Regulations (IHR) Emergency Committee urges that the response efforts be based on lessons learned and strong science. The World Health Organization (WHO) continues to work in partnership across the world to drive science, solutions and solidarity.

The COVID-19 virus transmits mainly between close contacts. Outbreaks can be controlled by preventing cases, protecting the vulnerable and empowering, educating and engaging communities. Countries need to be persistent in using the same tools as recommended from day one: find, isolate, test and care for cases, and trace and quarantine their contacts. Countries are proving that these fundamentals work.

The frustration that many people, communities and governments are feeling as the pandemic drags on is mounting. Unfortunately there are no shortcuts. The answer is simply using the tools that have proven to work.

On October 30<sup>th</sup> Manitoba's chief provincial public health officer, Dr. Brent Roussin, delivered an important and very serious message on the need to halt the growing community transmission of COVID-19 in Manitoba. The announcement included information regarding the Winnipeg Metro Region moving in to the Critical level (red) on the Pandemic Response System as of November 2<sup>nd</sup>. The rest of the province (Southern Health-Santé Sud, Prairie Mountain Health and Interlake-Eastern Health Regions) moved into the Restricted level (orange) on the Pandemic Response System on November 2<sup>nd</sup>. The Northern health region had previously moved in the Restricted level on October 26<sup>th</sup>.

Changes for our local region included public and private group gatherings limited to five (in addition to those in the household), restaurant and bar capacity limited to 50%, blended learning for grades 9 to 12, voluntary blended learning temporarily available for Kindergarten to Grade 8, spectators at sports and recreation facilities reduced to 25%, faith-based gatherings reduced to 20% or 250 people, whichever is lower.

Currently the health system has the capacity to care for the health needs of Manitobans but the current number of COVID cases is expected to cause a surge in the demand on our health system. Facilities are preparing for an increased demand by adding beds to existing areas, preparing to convert existing beds from their current use and identifying staff who can be oriented to new areas.

Manitobans are still encouraged to focus on the fundamentals to slow the spread of COVID-19.

- Stay home if sick.
- Wash/sanitize hands.
- Physical distance.
- Wear a mask if not able to physical distance.
- Reduce number of close contacts.
- Avoid crowded spaces.
- Get a flu shot.

All Manitobans have a role to play in protecting themselves and their communities. The Manitoba government has increased fines to \$1296 for individuals and \$5000 for businesses who do not follow Manitoba's public health and emergency orders. To reinforce these new deterrents, existing provincial regulations have been amended to enable municipal bylaw enforcement officers to enforce these orders.


