

### **Nature Notes**

### **Least Flycatcher**

A common summer breeding resident in Canada and the smallest of the eastern empids, the Least Flycatcher is perhaps the most often encountered small flycatcher in the east. During the breeding season the male makes a noisy territorial display, calling chee-BECK more than sixty times per minute while chasing other flycatchers in its territory. Note its small size, small bill, brown to olive wash on the upper parts and conspicuous eye ring and wing bars.

The Least Flycatcher is active, often changing perches. It flicks its tail and wings a lot, jerking its tail strongly upward. The male chases the female in courtship. It also chases ecologically similar American Redstarts out of nesting territories. This bird perches to spot prey, then catches it in the air while flying. It also gleans insects from branches and foliage. It eats a wide variety of insects, some spiders and a few berries and seeds.

The Least Flycatcher is monogamous, sometimes in loose colonies

The nest is of grass, bark strips, twigs, lichens and plant fibers. It is bound by spider or caterpillar web. It is built by the female in the fork of a tree or shrub 60 cm - 18 m above ground.

Incubation is 13-15 days by the female. The young stay in the nest for 12-17 days and are fed by both sexes. One to two broods are produced per year.

The Least Flycatcher is common are an uncommon host to cowbird.

# COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

The World Health Organization (WHO) has created a Task Force on COVID-19 Vaccines, Therapeutics and Diagnostics for Developing Countries. The purpose of this task force is to accelerate access and delivery of vaccines and other COVID-19 health tools to developing countries and to mobilize national leaders to remove critical roadblocks.

WHO is calling on G20 countries to embrace the target of at least 40% vaccine coverage in every country by the end of 2021 and at least 60% by the first half of 2022. Countries need to share more vaccine doses with developing countries and remove all barriers to the export of inputs and finished vaccines.

The Delta variant of COVID-19 is causing great concern globally. Delta is the most transmissible of the variants identified so far. It has been identified in at least 96 countries and is spreading rapidly among unvaccinated populations. As public health restrictions are eased an increase in transmission is being seen.

New variants are expected and will continue to be reported – that's what viruses do, they evolve – but the emergence of variants can be prevented by preventing transmission. It's quite simple: more transmission, more variants. Less transmission, less variants.

It is urgent that we use all the tools at our disposal to prevent transmission: the consistent use of public health measures, in combination with equitable vaccination.

As of June 26<sup>th</sup> new public health orders moved the province of Manitoba to Code Orange on the pandemic response system. Even with eased restrictions, Manitobans are still required to wear a mask indoors and physically distance.

Changes to public health orders include:

• Family members can visit retail businesses together.

- Outside gatherings on private property can include 10 people. Outside gatherings in public spaces can include 25 people.
- Personal service businesses can reopen by appointment at 50% capacity.
- Indoor self-help gatherings are permitted to reopen at 25% capacity up to 25 people.
- Gyms and fitness centers can reopen at 25% capacity with 3 meter distancing.
- Organized recreation activities can reopen outdoors with to 25 people and reopen indoors with 25% capacity up to 5 people.
- Swimming pools can reopen at 25% capacity.
- Summer day camps can reopen with up to 20 people.
- Restaurants and bars can reopen with 25% capacity. Only those who are fully vaccinated or who are from the same home can sit together.
- Restaurants and bars can reopen patios at 50% capacity with up to 8 people at a table.
- Indoor faith gatherings are permitted with 25% capacity. Outdoor faith-based gatherings are permitted with up to 50 people.
- Outdoor wedding and funerals are limited to 25 people.
- Those that are fully vaccinated can visit fully vaccinated people in personal care homes or hospitals.
- Those that are fully vaccinated can travel within Canada without self-isolating.

### **Continued from June Issue....**

Mr. Williams was the possessor of the first automobile at Langruth, a Model T of course. That was in 1911. We held our first Langruth picnic that year and an eventful day it was for many who had the joy of their first auto ride by paying Mr. Williams a small fee. During the years that followed Langruth kept up well with the auto pace so that by the year 1920, auto traffic had apparently become such a public menace that our first Lakeview council found it necessary to pass a by-law limiting the speed to ten miles an hour in the villages of Langruth and Amaranth and thirty miles an hour elsewhere.

A second picnic was held the following year and with such success that the ambitious committee of 1913 decided to make it something In fact, they invited premier, Hon. Rodmond Roblin. Mr. Roblin very graciously accepted and plans were laid for a real gala day. The weather proved ideal and the people flocked from far and near. Not everyone then had an auto but close to one hundred were parked along our streets. We also had a special train from Portage and in lieu of a band a Scotch piper arrived to lead the jubilation of "the baby town's third birthday". Eleven baseball teams took part in a grand tournament. The premier got a rousing reception and expressed himself as surprised by the big turn-out. He predicted great things for the district. Mr. Roblin was followed by our local member, Hon. Dr. Armstrong, and also be Mr. Arthur Meighen, the then new member for Portage la Prairie and destined to become Prime Minister of Canada. Mr. Roblin assured us that the telephone system would be extended to Langruth the following year and that the railway would shortly be extended about fifteen miles further north. This latter request by the way did not come from the Langruth people. They were quite satisfied to be at the end of the line. A new town site was shortly after laid out at the end of the proposed extension and named Amaranth as suggested by Councilor Robt. Johnson from the name of the township which he and his brother "Ed" and "Jo" Cooper had come from in Ontario.
