WestLake-Gladstone Declares State of Agricultural Disaster

On July 20, 2021 the Municipality WestLake-Gladstone declared a State Agricultural Disaster for the entire municipality. The municipality has received insufficient rainfall to allow land and pasture land to grow causing a situation of severe drought. The recent manifestation of the grasshopper population has resulted in severe crop damage. Agriculture is the main industry within the municipality and the and grasshopper destruction drought devastating.

There is a severe shortage of livestock feed in the municipality and the grazing situations have become critical. Dugouts are drying up and farmers are incurring unplanned expenses to drill additional wells to provide water to their livestock. It will be very expensive for farmers to purchase feed, hay or straw this year. Much will likely need to come from other areas adding the cost of freight to the cost of feed. Some farmers are making the difficult decision to sell their livestock due to the high cost of providing feed or the inability to do so.

Grain lands are expecting extremely low yields. Some farmers are considering options for salvaging what they can of their crops as feed.

Municipal Council has requested immediate assistance from the Government of Canada and the Province of Manitoba, Department of Agriculture to provide support and Ag Recovery to our farmers for tax deferrals, feed shortages, freight assistance and compensation for additional wells being drilled.

FIRE BAN

On July 8th the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone issued a Fire Ban that will remain in effect until further notice when conditions improve.

- The Fire Ban applies to outdoor fires involving burning of grass, crop residue and bushes.
- Fires in enclosed backyard fire pits <u>are</u> permitted but must be attended to at all times.

Persons who contravene this ban and are found guilty of starting a fire may be subject to fines and penalties. Thank you for your cooperation! Fire calls cost time, money, resources and risk fire fighters' safety.

Nature Notes

Horned Grebe

The 'horns' for which this bird is named are actually tufts of golden feathers above and behind the eyes, which are present only during the bird's breeding season. In summer the reddish neck of the Horned Grebe distinguishes it from the Eared Grebe, which shares much of the breeding grange. The horned Grebe's life is tied to water, breeding in fresh water habitats and often spending the winter both in freshwater and in salt water.

The Horned Grebe eats as its primary diet mostly fish and some crustaceans as well as aquatic insects. Tamer than other grebes, it often allows a close approach by humans.

The nest is a floating heap of wet material, including underwater plants, rotting vegetation, rubbish and mud often anchored to vegetation. The Horned Grebe's nest is often built so that it is concealed poorly or not at all.

The Horned Grebe is most often a solitary nester, sometimes in loose colonies of 4-6 pairs.

Incubation is 22-25 days by both sexes. The young are fed by both sexes. First flight is at 45-60 days. One brood is produced per year, sometimes two.

The Horned Grebe population is declining apparently due to oil spills and habitat loss.

Terry Fox Day – August 2nd, 2021

Manitoba recognized Terry Fox Day on August 2nd. Terry Fox was born in Winnipeg in 1958. After discovering a malignant tumor on his knee and undergoing surgery that removed 15 centimeters of his leg, Fox embarked on a cross-Canada run that lasted 143 days and 5 373 kilometers – all to raise money and awareness for cancer. Fox began his journey in St. John's Newfoundland in April of 1980. He ventured west until September of that year when chest pain forced him to stop in Thunder Bay, Ontario and call off the remainder of the run.

Manitoba was the first province to name a day in his honour marking the first Terry Fox Day on August 3, 2015. Other provinces are following Manitoba's lead and are renaming official days for Terry.

COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

The World Health Organization (WHO) reports that COVID-19 cases and deaths continue to climb. Trends suggest that the total number of cases will pass 200 million in the next two weeks. Much of the increase in cases is being driven by the highly transmissible delta variant, which has now been detected in at least 132 countries.

Although the delta variant is highly transmissible, it has not translated into increased mortality. It is known that public health and social measures work against the delta variant. Vaccines are safe and effective against severe disease and death. Those who have access to the vaccine are encouraged to get fully vaccinated.

WHO has warned that the COVID-19 virus has been changing since it was first reported and it continues to change. Four variants of concern have emerged and there will be more as long as the virus continues to spread.

The world has all the tools needed to end the pandemic. This disease can be prevented, can be tested for and can be treated. The pandemic will end when the world chooses to end it.

WHO's goal remains to support every country to vaccinate at least 10% of its population by the end of September, 40% by the end of 2021 and 70% by the middle of 2022. Just over half of countries have fully vaccinated 10% of their population, less than a quarter of countries have vaccinated 40% and only three countries have vaccinated 70%.

Each country needs to think about how to approach this pandemic as a world. The highest priority has to be helping all countries vaccinate at least 10% of their population.

Thanks to the efforts of all Manitobans, the province will implement new public health orders on August 7th. This comes one month earlier than forecasted after achieving the highest vaccination rates to date.

The new public health order follow the 4-3-2 One Great Summer Path to Reopen. Specifically, the new public health orders allow the following to open without restrictions:

- Indoor and outdoor gatherings at private residences.
- Gyms and fitness centres.
- Libraries.
- Personal services such as hair and nail salons.
- Day camps.
- Retail businesses, markets, and malls.
 Other sectors will open with limited restrictions:
- Capacity limits will remain in place for weddings, funerals and other public gatherings.
- No restrictions to size and space between tables at restaurants. Dining will not be restricted to households or vaccinated individuals.
- Museums and movie theatres will remain limited to 50% capacity.
- Casinos and bingo halls will continue to be limited to vaccinated individuals.
- Indoor and outdoor sports will fully reopen with limits on spectator capacity.
- Overnight camps will be permitted with limits on camper cohorts.

Unless you are fully vaccinated you are still at risk for severe effects of COVID-19. We are approaching a post-pandemic Manitoba but his does not mean COVID-19 will disappear. We need to remain cautious and vigilant in our efforts to stop the spread of this virus.

Continued from July Issue....

The 1913 summer picnic was a real "humdinger" and put Langruth on the map. Of course some of our good friends were kind enough to ascribe much of the hilarity of the occasion to the fact that the Ridge Hotel had just recently been opened. To say the least, Billy Grant that day did a rushing business. That of course was prior to the days of the Liquor Control Act.

Like many other Western towns at some time or other in their history, Langruth had its little oil excitement. Billy Grant was drilling a well behind the hotel and D.C. McArthur, a geologist and a former Landing boy, was stopping at the hotel and examining from time to time the samples brought up by the drill. When drilling was down a considerable distance some joker one night poured a little oil down the pipe. This led to considerable excitement and a party came up from Portage, including a supposed oil man from the U.S., who pronounced the possibilities as real good, at least according to the Portage Review, which carried a front page article on the subject. Of course our 'oily' hopes soon vanished but a heavy suspicion rested on Billy Grant.

That year (1913) Steini B. Olson, of Big Point, established our first separate lumber business which he successfully operated for a number of years. Mr. and Mrs. Olson are now residing at the Coast. Also in 1913 Gudni Thorleifson, of Big Point, took over the blacksmith business and later the implement business from Bjarnarson Bros., which together with the auto business Mr. Thorleifson continued for a number of years in a new location. S.B. Benedictson and John Finnson were pioneers of 1913 and Wm. Holmes, who later operated a dray business which was taken over by his son Alexander, who retired only the present year after thirty years in this business.

In October, 1913 M. Johnson's pool room and barber shop just North of the hotel took fire in the night and there was much excitement in the successful effort to save the hotel which was full of guests. Later, in 1915, Hannesons' store was constructed on the site, Mr. Johnson having rebuilt across the street.
