

Nature Notes

Northern Waterthrush

Northern Lakeshores, slow-running streams and bogs are the most common habitats of the Northern Waterthrush. Walking rather than hopping along the ground the Northern Waterthrush often is observed repeatedly bobbing the rear part of its body and its tail while searching for food. An early migrant, the Northern Waterthrush generally begins traveling southward by mid-June.

Northern Waterthrush live in solitary or in pairs. They are terrestrial but often sing from elevated perches and walk, bobbing on branches. They forage on the ground by picking up leaves with their bills and tossing them aside and turning them over. They eat aquatic and terrestrial adult insects, caterpillars and case worms. They also eat slugs, mollusks, crustaceans and sometimes small fish. They frequent areas with dense shrub and slowly moving or still water.

The nest is lined with grass, animal hair, moss, twigs, pine needles, bark strips and roots. It is often built in moss-covered stumps near water up to 60 cm above ground. It is built by the female.

Incubation and breeding biology is poorly known. Estimated incubation is 13 days by the female. Young are brooded by the female and stay in the nest about 10 days. They are fed by both sexes. There is one brood per year.

The Northern Waterthrush is generally common in wooded swamps, forests with standing water, bogs and thickets with slowly running or standing water.

Northern Waterthrush are uncommon hosts to cowbird parasitism and are a migratory species.

News from Here, There and Anywhere



Hello everyone. As usual there isn't much news from our small town and local area at the moment.

The fourth wave of the COVID-19 pandemic is apparently on its way and it may move faster because of the Delta variant. The only good news is less people are dying from this variant than the previous ones. I'm not sure that is really good news but we still need to prepare for it. The public health restrictions are changing again letting us know what we can do outside of our homes. Listen to the radio for the latest updates.

I know a lot of people have had the COVID-19 virus and I'm sure a lot more will contract it. The health care workers tell us that many hospitals are full due to treating so many people with the virus.

I haven't heard a whole lot about our schools. I'm sure there has been a lot of discussion over how to handle the pandemic once again. Should the schools open or remain closed? I guess we will see what the final decisions are in September. I'm sure that parents are nervous to send their children off to school again. Especially since children under the age of 12 are not eligible to be vaccinated yet. Hopefully the younger children will be eligible for the vaccination soon.

The next federal election will take place on Monday, September 20th. Many are wondering why we are having an election in the middle of a pandemic. I wonder if our current government just wants to get out of there after such a tough few years. In my opinion, one of the most important jobs right now is to get everyone vaccinated. Our government seems to be having a tough time getting that done because so many people are choosing not to be vaccinated.

There are a number of people in southern Manitoba who have chosen not to be vaccinated. I don't know what is going to happen. It has been shown that the vaccine is helping stop the COVID-19 virus. Hopefully more people will go for their vaccination so we can put this pandemic behind us.

I recently heard that someone I know in Winnipeg had contracted the Covid-19 virus. Apparently she was in the hospital for quite a while. Anyone can get this virus. It is so important to get vaccinated to protect yourself.

We have had a little bit of rain lately. The grass has turned green again and everything is looking lush again. I'm sure we could still use more rain as it was so dry all spring and summer. Many dugouts and pits were dry or close to dry so this rain will help to start replenishing some of that water. We will need a good snowfall and spring run off to get those dugouts back up to the level where they should be.

I don't know what the farmers are going to do about winter feed for their cattle. I assume that some will have to sell some of their herd if they aren't able to find hay, silage or pellets.

This has been the second or third dry summer. I don't know how all the farmers will cope if next summer isn't any better. The recent rain will help and we hope that they get through the coming fall and winter ok.

We had a little storm come through recently and the power was out for a few hours during the night. I had a little bit of a hard time because I am still getting used to this apartment and couldn't find my way around in the dark. I just stayed on my bed and waited for the power to come back on. Back at the farm we had lanterns we could light when the power was out. We don't have anything like that anymore.

The humming birds at the feeders are still drinking a lot. I don't know if they are stocking up for the long trip south or if everything is so dry they are relying on the feeders. They may be leaving early but that also could mean an early winter for us.

I noticed on the bulletin board that there will be a threshing party. I don't know how they are going to thresh with the crops being so short. I can't imagine that there is much grain in the heads this year. I remember years back waiting for the sun to dry the stooks so they could be put through the threshing machine. That is definitely different from this year. We were waiting for rain to fill out the grain so we can make stooks. I suppose the corn might be ok because it likes the warm weather. I notice that there are quite a few fields of corn in the area. I understand that the potato crops aren't very good this year either.

I bought a few cobs of corn from the store. I don't know if it was just the dry season or if the corn was picked too early but it certainly wasn't very good. I hope to get some better tasting corn before the season is over.

A neighbor here at Centennial Apartments had a lovely tomato that he let us raffle off as a Bingo prize. A guest visiting one of the residents was the lucky winner. He had a lovely tomato to eat on his drive home.

Quite a few people came out to play Bingo. It was a bit of a rainy day so there was a nice crowd of us playing.

We went out to Shirley Armstrong's farm for her annual luncheon. It was a reasonably warm day with a mix of sun and cloud. There sure were a lot of wasps and crickets out that day. I can understand the wasps coming out after the food but I don't why the crickets were out. Other people also noticed a lot of crickets this year. Maybe it is because it has been so dry. Whatever the reason they are singing their little hearts out.

It was unfortunate to hear of Julia Roulette's passing at the end of July. She was a main-stay in the Langruth community for many years. She lived here for a long time doing a lot of housekeeping. She always enjoyed visiting with people at the post office when she was picking up her mail. She seemed to know everyone.

I haven't heard of anyone doing any travelling or holidaying this summer due to the pandemic and the dry summer.

I see there are quite a few different cars on the roads these days. I imagine some people are starting to look at the electric cars. I think they are quite expensive. I hope that they will be available for the people that want them.

I noticed that there are still a lot of fires. In the States there are so many fires burning. There has been a lot of destruction in many areas. Some of the houses are big mansions. It is amazing how people keep rebuilding after losing their properties.

I would like to congratulate anyone who celebrated anniversaries recently. Helga and Eddie Lasson celebrated their 57th anniversary on August 8th. Congratulations! Happy birthday to anyone celebrating a birthday. Best wishes for a good year to come.

I went to church in Amaranth recently and noticed that Robert Waterston has put up a new building after his house burned in the spring. I'm sure Robert is happy to be back home.

I will be heading into Winnipeg to have some tests done at St. Boniface Hospital. Did you know

that they work in 24 hour shifts there? My appointment is a 6:30 pm so it will be a late night by the time I get back home.

Don't forget to check out the Langruth Harvest Festival on September 11th. It looks like it will be a nice afternoon and evening as usual. COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

After increasing for nearly two months, the global number of COVID-19 cases and deaths stabilized during the week of August 23rd. It is stable but at a very high level – more than 4.5 million cases and 68 thousand deaths.

The situation is very different from region to region, country to country, and town to town. Some regions and countries continue to see steep increases in cases and deaths, while others are declining. As long as this virus is circulating anywhere, it's a threat everywhere.

There are no shortcuts. WHO continues to recommend a comprehensive, risk-based approach of proven public health and social measures, in combination with equitable vaccination.

As we remain focused on ending the pandemic, WHO is moving forward with plans to understand its origins. Experts acting in their own capacity, not as representatives of Member States, will play a vital role in studying the emergence of new pathogens, including the next phase of studies into the origins of SARS-CoV-2.

As WHO works to understand how this pandemic started, WHO is also moving ahead with plans to strengthen the world's defenses against future epidemics and pandemics.

First reports recognize the need for better global governance of pandemic preparedness and response. They recognize the need for better systems and tools to prevent, prepare for, detect and respond rapidly to epidemics and pandemics. They recognize the need for better financing for global preparedness and response, including vaccines. They recognize the need for a strengthened, empowered and sustainably financed WHO at the centre of the global health architecture.

WHO continues to be committed to the mission to promote health, keep the world safe and serve the vulnerable.

After Manitoba's public health orders started to lift on August 7th, the Province introduced new public health orders on August 27th as health officials predicted a fourth wave of the pandemic.

A fourth wave of the pandemic is expected to occur due to the faster spread of the Delta variant and not enough people being fully immunized. The Delta variant is already causing a significant increase in cases throughout Western Canada in provinces that loosened restrictions earlier than Manitoba. Recent data shows the majority of new infections are occurring among those unvaccinated.

New public health orders include mask use in all indoor public spaces across Manitoba, including schools. It also includes a requirement that all front-line provincial employees, including health-care employees, teachers and child-care workers, who work with vulnerable populations to be fully vaccinated or agree to regular testing for the COVID-19 virus.

The new public health orders also include requirements for people to be fully vaccinated to participate in certain events and activities in all of Manitoba's health regions. Children aged 11 and under who are not eligible to be immunized will be able to attend events and activities with a fully vaccinated adult.

As of August 31st, the percentage of eligible Manitobans who have received one dose of the COVID-19 vaccination reached 82.1% and those who have received two doses reached 76.8%.

Continued from August Issue....

The outstanding event of 1914 was of course the First World War and we are proud to record that the people of Langruth and district were soon taking their part liberally in patriotic efforts and that a number of their finest young men were volunteering for Overseas service. We believe the entire district of Lakeview has a war record surpassed by few municipalities of its size and population in the West. To those who actively served their country our highest esteem and admiration, and those who did not return we hold in revered memory.

May 16th, 1914, the village had a narrow escape from a terrific bush fire which started about two miles to the South and was carried by an unusually high wind though the heavy bush East of the railway, consuming everything in its path. It also leaped across the railway as it neared the village. Langruth had at that time outside communication only by the railway telephone line, although the local lines were then under construction and a number of car-loads of poles were piled up on the station grounds. The C.N.R. sent up a special train from Portage to protect the station buildings and these poles and to remove some cars of their ties and lumber. meantime some of the poles of the railway line burned down, thus closing off all communication and the Portage Review carried a large head-line article to the effect that by last reports from Langruth there was little hope in saving the village. Fortunately, the next issue of the paper could state that 'the residents, men, women and children, by back-firing and bucket work finally won a heroic fight against the flames'.

By June 30th the local lines had been installed and the writer has a diary entry to the effect that on that date he made the first long distance call from Langruth, being to the Portage Review, and calling attention to this important event. The first telephone office was installed in Erlendson Bros. store, with Miss Runa Johannson (later Garrett) our first 'hello' girl. Langruth exchange started off with 48 phones and has been increased to 235.

RCMP Report

On August 9, 2021, at approximately 2:50 pm, Ste Rose du Lac RCMP received a report of an armed robbery at a business on Highway 50 in the RM of Alonsa.

Initial investigation has determined that three males wearing masks pulled up to the business, got out with firearms, and pointed them at the employees. They then stole an undisclosed amount of Canadian currency and cigarettes. They left in the same vehicle. None of the employees were physically injured.

Amaranth and Neepawa RCMP, as well as Manitoba First Nations Police Service, were notified of the suspect vehicle, which was found in Sandy Bay Ojibway First Nation. MFNP, the police force of jurisdiction in Sandy Bay, then conducted a traffic stop on a van in the community. One of the suspects from the robbery was visible in the van as was a firearm. All four occupants of the vehicle were arrested, three males and a female driver. The female has since been released without charge.

Francis Beaulieu, 31; Anton Levasseur, 26; and Victor Lavasseur, 29, all from Sandy Bay, remain in custody on charges of Robbery with a Firearm and various firearms offences.
