

Bald Eagle

The national bird of the United States has an awe-inspiring wingspan and striking white head



The Bald Eagle hunts for prey, primarily fish, especially in breeding season. Sometimes steals fish from ospreys. It also eats carrion and injured or crippled waterfowl, squirrels, rabbits and muskrats.

The nest of the Bald Eagle is made of large sticks and vegetation, deeply lined with fine material in the fork of a tall tree or on a ledge between 9 meters and 18 meters above the ground. The nest is built by both sexes.

Incubation is 31 - 46 days by both sexes. The young stay in the nest 70 - 98 days until their first flight. The young are fed by both sexes. The Bald Eagle has 1 brood per year.

The Bald Eagle is protected by national wildlife refuges and legally with heavy fines. It has made a great comeback, especially in the United States, since the 1970's with wide scale restoration programs and the banning of DDT and other chemical pollutants.

COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

The World Health Organization (WHO) reports that globally there have been more than 300 million reported cases of COVID-19 and over 5.4 million reported deaths.

During the week of January 3rd more than 15 million new cases were reported to WHO, by far the most cases reported in a single week. This is up from 5 million just 3 weeks prior.

The Omicron variant has spread throughout the world at blistering speed. The Omicron variant is rapidly replacing the Delta variant in almost all countries. However, the number of weekly reported deaths has remained stable since October 2021, at an average of 48 thousand deaths a week.

While the number of patients being hospitalized is increasing in most countries, it is not at the level seen in previous waves. This is possibly due to the reduced severity of Omicron, as well as widespread immunity from vaccination or previous infection.

While Omicron causes less severe disease than Delta, it remains a dangerous virus, particularly for those who are unvaccinated.

Learning to live with this virus does not mean we should accept the number of deaths that are still occurring. We must not allow this virus a free ride or wave the white flag, especially when many people worldwide remain unvaccinated.

We have a long way to go to reach the target of vaccinating 70% of the world population by the middle of this year. 90 countries have not reached 40% and 36 of those countries have vaccinated less than 10% of their populations.

The overwhelming majority of people admitted to hospitals around the world are unvaccinated. While vaccines remain effective at preventing severe disease and death, they do not fully prevent transmission. More transmission means more risk of another variant emerging that is more transmissible and more deadly than Omicron.

In Manitoba, the current COVID-19 prevention orders were extended to February 1st. Manitoba remains on the Restricted (Orange) level on the Pandemic Response System. On December 28th, 2021 public health orders were updated to reduce the gathering sizes to help curb community transmission of the omicron variant.

The restrictions included gatherings not exceeding 50% of capacity or 250 people, whichever is less. This includes indoor and outdoor public gatherings, restaurants, movie theatres, museums, sporting and recreational facilities, gyms, fitness centres, religious services, bingos and businesses with VLTs. restrictions also included liquor sales in restaurants and licensed premises ending at 10:00 These capacity limits apply to pm daily. gatherings where all attendees are fully vaccinated, have a medical reason not to receive a vaccine or people under 12 years of age. All other public health orders remained unchanged.

The province continues to gather data and monitor the impacts of the Omicron variant. The ongoing restrictions remain necessary to help slow the spread of the virus and protect the health-care system.

To manage the growing demand for COVID-19 testing the Manitoba government is making take-home, self-administered rapid tests available. If an individual's rapid test is positive, they are advised to return for a PCR test to confirm the result.

Lake Manitoba Flood Class Action Lawsuit Settlement

A class action lawsuit was initiated against the Province of Manitoba in 2013 on behalf of those affected by the 2011 Lake Manitoba flood waters.

A Settlement Agreement has been reached and approved by the Manitoba Court of Queen's Bench that settles litigation involving the flooding of Lake Manitoba in 2011 which caused damage to areas surrounding Lake Manitoba through the operation of Provincial Water Control Works in 2011. The Government of Manitoba has agreed to pay to Class Members \$85,500,000.

All persons who owned real or personal property off reserve, within a 30 km radius of Lake Manitoba, that was damaged by the flooding of Lake Manitoba in 2011 may be eligible to make a claim for compensation.

Using the 3rd Finger for Peace & Calm

What? When someone uses the 3rd finger it is usually out of frustration and/or anger.

Let me introduce another way the 3rd finger may be used in stressful times. We know where the notorious 3rd finger is located on our hands. Put



the 3rd fingers behind the top of both your left and right ears. Now slide the 3rd fingers down along the sides of your head against the back of your ears until they reach a dip behind each ear lobe where the ear lobe attaches to your head. This dip is an acupressure point for your adrenals and stress. Keep your 3rd fingers in place and bring both your hands down, palms facing the neck and join them, under the chin so your palms cover both sides of the front of your neck. Your palms are now over your vagus nerve. The vagus nerve may be stimulated to calm the body. Now to help bring calm and de-stress, breathe in through your nose. Then putting your tongue at the top of the roof of your mouth, breath out more slowly through your mouth not your nose. If desired, exhaling using a Dark Vader breath may further increase vagus nerve balancing.) Do this at least 4 times and more if necessary. This can be done sitting, standing or while lying in bed before sleep.

Continued from December Issue....

The new municipality (R.M of Lakeview) had its troubles at the start but the following year (1921) the Auditor's report gave us the following commendation: "Your municipality has every appearance of being efficiently and economically managed and if you could only collect a reasonable amount of your outstanding taxes you would be in a very favorable position."

However, within a few years Lakeview was feeling the effects of the general depression which was putting so many municipalities and business firms in financial difficulties. The situation in Lakeview was aggravated by reason of many soldier settlers having abandoned their lands, leaving unpaid taxes and such lands being owned by the Government were not subject to tax sale or further taxable. In many instances there was some excuse for these abandonments, as many of the lands selected for the soldiers by the Government were inferior. Lakeview eventually came through it all successfully, though it was necessary to request the Government to administer direct the area where there was the most difficulty in collecting taxes, namely, the Northern two wards area. This request the Government assented to as at September 1st, 1927, and from that time Lakeview has had little difficulty in financing its curtailed area of approximately six townships and as now divided into four wards.

I might mention two special enterprises – both under the reeveship of Mr. Hall, namely, the establishment of the Muskrat Ranch in the Grass Marsh area and the Community Pasture comprising forty-five sections, also in the Western area. The former has yearly been bringing substantial returns to the municipality and the latter is proving a great boon to the farmers and stock men. Also about that time we got a good start in improved road machinery. Under Mr. Thordarson's reeveship the Council has been keeping well astride the times in road machinery and doing considerable splendid work, particularly in road building. Also, the present

year saw the construction of a substantial new municipal building, a credit to the municipality and of course municipal men in particular are quite proud of it. And although our taxes have been climbing a little due much to increased school expenses and the general inflation, the rate-payers no doubt feel they are getting good value for their money. The following comprise the present (1950) Lakeview Council: Reeve, G. F. Thordarson; Councillors, J. L. Gardiner, A. M. Johnson, V. Bjarnarson and R. Bott with J. E. Morison, Secretary-Treasurer.

The Royal Bank of Canada was opened at Langruth in August, 1919, with O. G. Bjornson, of Winnipeg, temporary manager. T. D. Holloway took over shortly after and there was a staff of four, with for a time a sub-branch at Amaranth open two days of the week. Later managers have been Robert Halliday, W. C. Ruggles and T. M. Willet who recently retired and has been succeeded by F. A. Thorgrimsson. Our bank managers have all been outstanding citizens taking a leading part in all worthy enterprises. The bank first took space in the front of G. Thorleifson's implement building but soon the present site was secured and the building on it made suitable. The bank has now a staff of five.

This implement warehouse was in 1920 secured by R. L. Stevenson to open our first separate garage and later he and E. P. Gibson constructed a hall of part of this building and an annex which was used for public and social meetings until the construction of our first community hall.

Mr. and Mrs. Gibson warrant some special mention. Mr. Gibson was our assessor at times. He was a clever cartoonist and frequently delighted audiences with his skill and humor. Mrs. Gibson was our Municipal Secretary-Treasurer from shortly after Lakeview was established until September, 1927. Mr. and Mrs. Gibson are now residing on the Coast.

As to the proposed Memorial Agricultural Hall, our first Lakeview council decided not to proceed with this project in the meantime as the general outlook did not warrant it and particularly on account of the high cost of material and labour at the time.

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
