Nature Notes

Boreal Owl

This small flat-headed owl is



seldom seen because it is strictly nocturnal and sits concealed close to the trunk of a thick conifer when on its daytime perch. Its white facial disks are bordered with black.

During irruptive flight in winter, when the owl comes far south of its normal winter range into the middle and eastern US, most individuals seem to be females and many are found seeking shelter in buildings.

Juveniles are similar to adults on the upperparts, but they are a rich chocolate brown below with a dark brown facial disk, whitish upturned mustache and a white wedge between the eyes that spreads above them on the forehead.

The Boreal Owl is nocturnal and solitary. It prefers thick old growth coniferous forest. It feeds primarily on small rodents and other small mammals, rarely on small birds.

It nests in a tree cavity, usually a woodpecker hole. No lining is added and it is 6 - 24 meters above the ground. The Boreal Owl will use manmade nest boxes.

The incubation is 26 - 37 days by both sexes. Young stay in the nest 28 - 36 days. The female feeds them with food brought by male. The Boreal Owl has one brood per year.

Northern populations are in no danger. The status of western populations is not well known but the Boreal Owl is vulnerable to logging operations.



Arksey Family Memorial proposed to be designated a Municipal Heritage Site

The Arksey family moved to Canada from England in the 1830s, settling in the Whitby, Ontario area. Thomas and Mary Arksey's son John moved to Manitoba, settling first on the Portage Plains near Macdonald then moving to the Langruth area in 1901. John, his wife Margaret, and their four children made their home on the SW ¼ of 5-16-9 W1, in what is now the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone.

The yard site served as a stopping place for weary travelers on the highway. In time, John's son Jack and his wife Maude would raise their nine sons in the same yard.

In June 1942, Jack and Maude's son Walter was reported missing in action and presumed dead in World War Two action. He is commemorated at Viroflay New Communal Cemetery near Versailles, France. In 2006, Master Corporal Timothy J. Wilson, son of Jane and Dale Wilson, great-great-grandson of John Arksey, died while serving with the Princess Patricia's Light Infantry in Afghanistan. Tim was raised just a half mile from this site and is buried in the military cemetery in Brandon, Manitoba.

On January 19, 2022 the Council of the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone gave first reading to Bylaw 2022-05 to designate the Arksey Family Memorial as a municipal heritage site under *The Heritage Resources Act*. A public hearing will be held on March 16, 2022 where any person may submit an objection or other representation on the proposal.

The World Health Organization (WHO) is encouraged to see that deaths from COVID-19 are now declining globally. It is pleasing to see some countries being able to relax restrictions, without their health systems being overwhelmed.

It's far too early to declare victory over COVID-19. There are still many countries with high rates of hospitalization and death, and low rates of vaccine coverage. With high transmission rates, the threat of a new and more dangerous variant remain very real. WHO continues to urge all people in all countries to exercise caution, and all governments to support their people to protect themselves and others.

The only sustainable way out of the pandemic is to reach high vaccine coverage in all countries. Globally, 56% of the world's population has been fully vaccinated, but only 9% of the population of low-income countries.

WHO also recognizes that the effects of the pandemic go far beyond the death and disease caused by the virus itself. COVID-19 has taken a heavy toll on mental health. A new WHO report estimates that in the first year of the pandemic, the global prevalence of anxiety and depression increased by more than 25%. The greatest increases in depression and anxiety were found in places that were the most affected by COVID-19, where infections were high and social interaction was restricted. WHO's review found that females were more affected than males, and younger people, especially those aged between 20 and 24 were more affected than older adults.

This increase in the prevalence of mental health problems coincided with severe disruptions to mental health services, and an under investment in mental health, leaving huge gaps in care for those who need it most.

Manitoba is moving forward with a plan to reduce public health restrictions. Premier Heather Stefanson has noted that Manitoba will continue to make adjustments as needed in the coming weeks based on the guidance of public health officials. The collective efforts and dedication of Manitobans to protect one another has allowed some restrictions to be lifted.

On February 15th Manitoba moved to the Yellow (Caution) level of the Pandemic Response System. Capacity limits were eliminated in venues such as restaurants, sporting events and gatherings at private residences. Young people ages 12 to 17 participating in indoor sports and recreation will no longer be required to provide proof of vaccination or recent testing.

Also as of February 15th, close contacts of a person who tests positive for COVID-19 is no longer required to self-isolate. Additionally, public health moved self-isolation requirements for individuals entering the province. Anyone travelling from international destinations is still required to meet requirements under the federal Quarantine Act. Public health orders restricting travel to northern Manitoba remain in place.

Proof of vaccination requirements were lifted on March 1st. Mask requirements and other restrictions are to be lifted on March 15th.

Manitobans are reminded that this is an important time of transition and we still need to get vaccinated, wear a mask and do simple but important things like washing our hands and staying home when we are sick. We need to remain cautious about gathering sizes, even as we shift from public health rules to public health recommendations. Continued from March Issue....

In 1923 the Langruth Community Club was organized and the immediate undertaking of its members was the dismantling and removal to Langruth of a former community building at Marshland which had been very generously donated by the Icelandic people for that purpose. This material we used in constructing the basement portion of our first Community Hall. It was roofed over at that and from time to time was further extended and improved as funds were raised for the purpose until eventually we had a very nice hall indeed. That is until early one morning in October, 1934, when our prized community hall was discovered to be in flames and nothing could be done to prevent its total destruction. A second and very substantial building was soon under way. It was of first class material throughout and built with considerable forethought and care. In fact, we considered it a model community building. Full basement with kitchen and dressing rooms, fine stage and a gallery across the rear. We were indeed very proud of it. But alas, it had only been completed a few weeks when it also burned down one morning in March, 1935, the fire beginning about the same hour as with the former building. The origin of these fines remains a mystery though no doubt both were of incendiary origin.

A temporary building was used for the next two years when we constructed our third community hall, though on a much humbler scale than the preceding one. However, this structure has been gradually improved from time to time until we have our present splendid building, a place within it walls as with our former halls and they have been of inestimable value in knitting our people together in worthy undertakings of social, educative and patriotic natures. Indeed, the very splendid teamwork of our community could not have been possible without our community centre.

The United Church building, formerly a little Methodist Church, at North Lakeland, was moved to Langruth in 1925, where it was renovated and enlarged to form the present United Church. In 1929 the Lutheran congregation constructed their beautiful and substantial edifice which has continued to serve not only for religious services but has been generously granted on many occasions for other worthy purposes.

Langruth and district have continued to forge ahead, especially during recent years. Up-to-date places of business have been constructed from time to time and many very nice residences both in town and country. Besides our splendid municipal building a beautiful and modern theatre of Quonset construction was built the present year (1950), a great credit to the enterprising proprietor, Mr. Joseph Karaz. We have a very nice Veterans' Hall with annex for the Ladies' Auxiliary, a new Curling Rink which was constructed two years ago, a new school projected as already referred to and the people have voted favorably for a Hospital which will have Government assistance in the construction. In December last Langruth was connected up with the Provincial Hydro System and which is to be extended to the farms next year. New lands are each year being brought under cultivation and the country beams with prosperity. Indeed, the people are proud of their little town and district and are optimistic about the future.

My former partner "Jud" Ruth now residing at the Coast visited us two years ago and it was all a surprise to him. The last time he was here Langruth didn't have a name and there was not a clearing on the spot. He later wrote us: "Langruth is one of the best little towns in the West."

The creek that crosses the highway just south of the elementary school at the south end of town is called McIvor's Creek. If you went further east you would have ended up at the Boy Scout camp. It was quite the setup, with a bridge that went over the creek to get to the camp.

The little creek was known to old-timers as McKeever's Creek named after the favorite camping ground of a man named McKeever. This same McKeever (or McIvor) may have found this to be a good place for trapping beavers as the wings of a former beaver dam existed there for very many years [*Langruth Views, April, 2021*].
