May 12th is Manitoba Day

Ushering Manitoba into Confederation was a long, hard-fought road, which started with the largest land



sale in history by the Hudson's Bay Company in 1868. Rupert's Land, which the Hudson's Bay Company "owned," was sold to the Dominion of Canada.

In October of 1869, the Red River Métis called for an independent Métis republic, known as the Métis National Committee, to be formed. The committee elected John Bruce as president and Louis Riel as secretary. A group of 120 men seized Upper Fort Garry in November and on December 8, 1869, a provisional government consisting of both English-speaking and French-speaking Métis was formed.

It was this provisional government, led by Louis Riel, which negotiated Manitoba's entry into the Canadian Confederation. Before the Manitoba Act was passed, the Convention of Forty, consisting of 20 English-speaking Métis and 20 French-Speaking Métis delegates, worked to draft the second "Bill of Rights", which formed the basis of the Manitoba Act.

The Manitoba Act came into law and was passed by Parliament of Canada and received Royal Assent on May 12, 1870, with the act officially proclaimed on July 15, 1870, when Manitoba joined the Confederation of Canada as the fifth province.

Important provisions in the Act included: bilingual denominational schools, judicial and parliamentary systems, and measures to address their "Indian" title to the land, through the granting of 1.4 million acres of land to Métis families.

Neither Louis Riel nor the Métis were initially credited as founders of Manitoba. It was not until more than 120 years later, on March 10, 1992, that Ottawa officially recognized Louis Riel as the founder of Manitoba. It was Louis Riel's vision, dedication and ultimate sacrifice that laid the groundwork for minority rights, and cultural cooperation in Manitoba, making it the province we know today.

Nature Notes

Snowy Owl

The Snowy Owl, a heavybodied owl, breeds on the Arctic Tundra and winters on grasslands, marshes, coastal beaches and



dunes. Regional crashes of Arctic lemming populations force these owls far south in some winters. This is our only all-white owl. Females and juveniles are similar and show more dusky barring than the males.

These owls are active in daylight and darkness. They often perch on the ground or close to it on posts, rocks, dunes ice, hay bales or buildings.

The Snowy Owl eats primarily small mammals (voles and lemmings on breeding grounds) but takes some birds and fish.

The male owl defends the nest and young fearlessly. It often does a 'crippled bird' act to lure predators away from the nest.

Their nest is a simple depression, unlined or minimally lined with moss, lichen and plucked grass, on a raised site with good visibility. The female builds the nest.

Incubation is 31-34 days long and by either the male and female or the female alone. The young stay in the nest for 14-21 days and are fed by both sexes. Their first flight is at 43-57 days. They have 1 brood per year. The number of eggs depends on the food supply.

News from Here, There and Anywhere

Hello There! It seems like it has been quite a while since I have written to you. We had to replace our voice recorder and I am still getting used to the new machine.

There hasn't been much news lately but we will fill in as much as we can.

We have had a lot of rain recently. It rained here in Gladstone all day Friday and Saturday. It would have been very welcome to all those that were in need of rain for their fields and pastures last year. We didn't have much of any rain last year but this year we have already had a lot of moisture in the form of snow. Since this last rain was the third Colorado Low in three weeks with moisture, wind and cold, we now have the needed moisture and are hoping for sunshine. They say that a farmer is a farmer for tomorrow - next year will always be better. We hope that they are right this time and this will be a good year.

I went to Winnipeg a short while ago and saw that a number of fields had a great deal of standing water on them. It was strange how one field was flooded and the next had almost no water on it. I think there was more rain towards the east. So far there isn't much flooding in our area. There is some standing water that will most likely soak in or drain away.

I hear that most of the dugouts have filled up with the spring runoff and rains. Hopefully it will see us through the summer season. The last couple of years have been so very dry. The grass and wild flowers didn't grow properly. We didn't even get any strawberries last year. People usually come from far and wide to pick strawberries in Portage and other areas.

After the last couple years the hay is rather sparse. Some farmers had to sell some of their cattle because they didn't have enough feed to get them through the winter. The cows will be happy to have the moisture for some better summer pastures and winter feed. Hopefully the herds can be restocked.

Lake Manitoba was quite low as well last year. We are hoping that it gets back to its normal level.

People were saying that the snow this winter was a dry snow and wouldn't make a lot of

runoff. To me it seemed like it was as wet as ever but when it melted there weren't a lot of puddles.

I know that many farmers will be getting anxious to get seeding but I'm afraid they will have to wait a little longer as there were still a few snowflakes coming down this morning. We hope that there will be a turnaround in the weather over the next couple weeks so we can get back to our normal spring seeding and gardening.

We have about 10 deer that come through the back yard of the Centennial Apartments here in Gladstone looking for food. Some seem to be injured in one way or the other. One day there was a deer in the group that was missing most of one leg. I don't know what happened to it but you should have seen it go through the snow drifts. It didn't seem to have any problems and surprisingly it looked very healthy. It is funny how the deer are all different sizes. Some are quite big and some are quite small, still in the growing stages.

There are a lot of people that like to watch the deer but we aren't supposed to feed them so they don't come right to our doors. Some people put out feed for the birds and the deer try and get that feed. They somehow get into the little feeders. I have heard that the deer population has grown and they are hungry after a long winter.

It is with great sadness that we had to report on the sudden passing of Norman Arnason last month. I also read that Elaine Symesko passed away recently. Many will remember her from the Amaranth area. She was the daughter of Frank and Lucy Symesko and Arnie Symesko's sister. We send deepest sympathy to the Arnason family and to the Symesko family.

We also heard of the passing of Jean Wade (Carson). She passed away on February 23rd at the age of 98 years. Jean was born in Langruth and was the daughter of John and Ellie Carson.

Keith Stephenson, Philip and Phyllis Thordarson's brother-in-law in Calgary passed away recently. We send sympathy to the Thordarson and Stephenson families.

We need to make a correction to some information in the April issue. Last month we reported the passing of Mildred Armstrong (Dell). She was the second youngest daughter of Fred and Martha Dell (not the second daughter as reported last month). The Dells had seven

I had to get a new television because my old one quit. The new television is obviously different than the old one and I am learning how to use it. It is certainly is a work in progress.

When I was in Winnipeg a few weeks ago I saw the doctor to find out if I should have a procedure on my heart. My heart is a little weak and I am getting tired. According to the doctor I shouldn't go through with the procedure due to my age. (I'm 88 years old now) He feels that it could do more harm than good. He hopes that medication will help. Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee

A new Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal (Manitoba) is being created to celebrate the 70th anniversary year of Queen Elizabeth's accession to the throne.

As we celebrate Her Majesty's 70 years of extraordinary service as Queen of Canada and head of the Commonwealth, this commemorative medal allows us to pay tribute to the Queen's devotion to duty and her kindness and compassion to all by recognizing citizens across Manitoba who also make service to their communities a priority.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee is the international celebration marking the 70th anniversary of the accession of Queen Elizabeth II to the thrones of seven countries including Canada on February 6th, 1952. She is the first monarch in Canada's modern era to have celebrated a platinum jubilee. The Queen has visited Manitoba six times, first as a princess in 1951 and most recently in 2010.

May 2022 Flood Report

Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure's Hydrologic Forecast Centre continues to monitor flood activity as water levels on streams and tributaries in most of Manitoba may continue to be impacted by run-off from precipitation at the end of April. Although water levels on small creeks and drains are beginning to stabilize, many larger rivers and streams are continuing to rise as water moves through the system.

Water levels are expected to remain high for an extended duration in many areas in southern and central Manitoba. In the Red River Valley, the province remains at a high state of readiness for water levels similar to 2009 spring flood levels on the Red River between Emerson and the Red River Floodway inlet.

Several communities throughout the province continue to be impacted by high water levels. Reported impacts to date include loss of road access, flooded properties and damage to infrastructure. As a result of these impacts, seven municipal emergency operations centres have been activated and states of local emergency have been declared in 18 communities. (Editor's note: The Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone has been recently added to the list.)

Warnings and high water advisories are in effect for many waterways. A flood watch remains in place for the Whitemud River. A flood warning for the Assiniboine River has been expanded to include the area from Shellmouth Dam to Brandon. As outflows from the dam are increased flooding of low lands along the Assiniboine River will increase. The Portage Diverson along with the Red River Floodway continue to operate to lower water levels in Winnipeg.

Flood forecasters will continue to monitor precipitation amounts and assess impacts on flows and levels.

Any water control works performed in the Municipality require approval from Council. Applications for water control works are reviewed at regular council meetings and must be given approval before making application to the Province.

The Municipality has invested in providing landowners with easier access to the documents required to make applications to the Province. A public portal for the Municipality allows applicants to view the LiDar imagery providing data on Drainage flow, Elevation & Topography, Provincial Wetland Designation, Ag Soil Capacity and Bare Earth Elevation data. The data is available for download to be used in your own programs and applications.
