Medics Supporting Medic's Mental Health

Being a paramedic requires specialized training. It's a role that requires an individual to work in high-pressure, fast-paced and adrenaline-fueled environments every day. It's also a profession that is grounded in compassion, where caring for patients during some of their most vulnerable moments is a common part of the job.

As many health care providers can confirm, when pressure and stress are always high, it can take a toll on your mental wellness.

"It doesn't always matter how strong you are individually or how many years you have been on the job," said Kerry Wilson, South Zone EMS Superintendent, Shared Health. "I think of it like a filing cabinet that's reaching capacity. There's a point where you try and shove in more files of difficult or challenging calls in and then the whole drawer pops right open."

Wilson is intimately familiar with the job, having worked as a paramedic for the past 20 years. In his role as superintendent, Wilson supervises paramedic teams working out of 19 stations across the South zone. He also played a key role in creating the Mental Health Wellness team – a colleague-to-colleague support for team members navigating difficult emotions or outcomes from challenging calls.

The Mental Health Wellness team is a volunteer-based program built to be proactive and reactive, providing supports for members of the team through workshops and accessible resources but also the personal connection of having another paramedic check in on them.

"The reality is sometimes we cope well, and sometimes we don't – and that's okay," said Evelyn Hoogerdijk, South Zone EMS Quality Officer with Shared Health. "You never know what might be a trigger. That's why our peer support team offers a safe space for people to speak up if they need it and we make sure there is a voice and an ear on the other end of the line."

As part of this initiative, Wilson gets notified of challenging calls and delegates a Mental Health Wellness Team member to follow up with the individuals on the call.

Individuals on the Mental Health Wellness Team are interviewed and specifically chosen to ensure they are a good fit. Each team member receives specialized training to support their peers, to help them navigate tough calls and to notice if a colleague may be struggling with a type of mental health crisis or injury.

Calls with the Mental Health Wellness team remain confidential and provide a safe space for paramedics to tell their story. If there are any indications of self or future harm the call will be escalated. Early recognition is key and follow-up calls, as Wilson puts it, help to unload some of the difficult files from the cabinet.

"Being a paramedic is a rewarding career and there are moments where you know you've made a difference, even if you don't hear it, and that feeling is bigger than any paycheck," described Wilson. "But I know how this job can wear on you and I truly care about my team going home and being happy and healthy for their families and loved ones. It makes for a better environment for everybody."

Wilson's top mental health wellness tips:

- 1. Know your limitations sometimes the cabinet is full. Recognize your capacity.
- 2. Find what coping mechanisms work best for you.
- 3. Remember it is okay to not be okay and it's okay to talk about it. Reach out when you need help.

During Paramedic Services week, May 22-28, Shared Health recognized the courage and commitment of Manitoba emergency response teams, including emergency medical staff, first responders, dispatchers and paramedics — who answer the call for help every day and keep our communities safe.

Nature Notes

Northern Pintail

No other American duck has the body shape of a pintail, either on the water or in the air. It holds its long slender neck erect and its long pointed tail at an upward angle on the water. In flight pintails are long and slender with a white trailing edge on the inner wing.

The Northern Pintail is a dabbling duck; it prefers shallow freshwater, where it feeds primarily on vegetable material. Flocks of pintails have the reputation of losing altitude rapidly, zig-zagging in for a landing from considerable heights on wings that produce an audible "swish" and planing directly into a landing. They are low-flying on breeding grounds. Nesting individuals are sometimes killed by hitting utility wires and fences.

The nest is lined with grasses, mosses, leaves and added down. It is on dry ground among short vegetation near water. The female builds the nest.

Incubation is 22-25 days by the female. The young leave the nest within a few hours of hatching. Their first flight is at 36-57 days. The young are tended by the female but they find their own food. There is one brood per year.

The Northern Pintail is abundant in the west and very common in the east. Although they are widespread and abundant some surveys show a decline since the 1960s. As with other dabbling ducks, lead shot ingested from bottom ooze often leads to death.

What Happened With the Petition for the 3 Ward System and How Did Council Vote?

These are two questions I am often asked as I initiated the petition that requested the Municipality of Westlake-Gladstone return to the Ward System of government. The municipality is currently represented by the At-Large System of government. The Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone had the Ward System in place for the first four years after amalgamation. I will outline the events.

The petition stated the following:

We, the citizens of the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone, hereby request that the At-Large System of government that is presently in place in our municipality be replaced by the 3 Ward System that went into effect when the three municipalities amalgamated in 2014, for the 2022-2026 term.

I signed and initiated this petition on October 27th, 2021 and handed it into the municipal office on November 9th, 2021.

The petition was circulated in the Gladstone, Westbourne, Langruth and Plumas areas for only 14 days. 234 legal signatures had been collected when it was handed in to the municipal office. This met the legal time requirements to have the matter voted on and a new By-Law created if the representation system was to be changed. It had to be done quickly because the municipal act states the following in relation to wards.

Section 87 (3) A by-law under this section must: (a) take effect only at a general election; and

(b) be passed at least 180 days before the general election at which it is to take effect.

Further, if council chooses to create a by-law for a ward system, public notice of the proposed by-law needs to be given prior to the third reading and it is council's decision to use the ward system or not.

On November 17th, 2021, at 10:00 a.m., I appeared as a delegation to council to further explain why the petition was created. Access TV recorded this presentation and discussion.

On December 15th, 2021 Councillor Bud Sigurdson submitted this notice of motion.

"I am requesting that Council have a vote to bring back the 'Three Ward System' of voting as took place in the 2014 election for Council. The three wards are to be East Ward, West Ward and the Town of Gladstone with the voting borders the same as the 2014 election. There will be 2 Councillors elected from each ward. This would only be for election purposes as all Councillors would be required to represent all wards."

Bud Sigurson's notice of motion was brought forward and discussed at the January 19th, 2022 council meeting. It is my understanding and belief that the final resolution that was voted on was clearly different than Bud's original notice of motion submitted on December 15th 2021. In order to verify this I purchased a DVD copy of both my presentation to council on November 17th, 2021 and the January 19th, 2022 public council proceedings from Access TV. Council's discussion lasted close to an hour. I encourage everyone to view the video to understand how the resolution that was voted on was changed from Bud Sigurdson's original notice of motion. According the January 19th, 2022 minutes, the resolution voted on was:

"Now Therefore Be It Resolved that for the 2022 Municipal Election council choses to remain at large".

The recorded vote, according to the January 19th, 2022 minutes, indicates that both Bud Sigurdson and Gerald Doell voted against remaining at large. Randy Bjarnarson, Dawn Coubrough, Monica Ferguson, Scott Kinley and Darcy Meloney voted in favour of remaining at large. This motion was carried.

If anyone is interested in viewing the videos of the presentation and proceedings I still have the DVD's. If you signed the petition and would like to view the public record of the events that can be arranged.
