Constable 2307 Ryan Bohm passed away in 2017 at the age of 43 after battling colorectal cancer. Ryan was a hard-working and dedicated officer that worked on District 2 Team 4 of the Vancouver Police Department for his entire 13 year policing career. Members of the Vancouver Police Department who had the pleasure of knowing Ryan have decided to create a challenge coin in his memory.

Ryan, the son of Jim and Maureen Bohm, was born and raised in Langruth where he grew up on a farm. Ryan moved to B.C. to follow his girlfriend, Donna, who would later become his wife. Together they had two daughters, Adrianna and Nadia. Ryan's stories of growing up on the farm always made him the most interesting person in any room and everyone that knew him loved him.

Ryan was mentoring a junior constable when they attended a store for a call. Ryan saw a taxidermy badger inside the store and he purchased it after dealing with the incident. Ryan affectionately nicknamed the badger, Bucky, and it rode in the car between him and his partner for the remainder of the shift. Bucky quickly became a mascot for Ryan and the team throughout his battle with cancer. Badgers are known for their strength and are fearless when confronted by larger predators. This really symbolized Ryan and his battle with cancer. The back of the coin features an image of Bucky along with the Manitoba shield and the initials of his family members.

All proceeds from the sale of the coins will be donated to Cops for Cancer in memory of Ryan.

Nature Notes

Eared Grebe

The 'ear' for which this bird is named is a wide golden tuft of feathers behind the eyes, present only in breeding plumage. It has a more triangular-shaped head than other grebes and is the only one that has a black neck during breeding season. The neck remains dusky gray in winter – a good field mark. The slender, dark bill appears slightly upturned.

The Eared Grebe lives in pairs and family groups during the nesting season but often nests in dense colonies of up to several hundred pairs. Breeding pairs have several mutual displays, including an upright 'penguin dance' side-by-side on the water. They forage by diving and swimming under water for aquatic insects, which make up most of its summer diet. Many winter in marine environments, where shrimp like crustaceans become their principal food.

This is a gregarious bird that often gathers in large flocks in the winter. They tend to ride higher on the water than the somewhat similar Horned Grebe.

The nest is made from fresh and decayed vegetation, floating but anchored by standing vegetation. It is built by both sexes.

Incubation is 20-22 days by both sexes. The young leave the nest after the last egg hatches. They are fed by both sexes and become independent 21 days after hatching. There is one brood per year sometimes two.

Eared Grebe populations are common. They are becoming increasingly more common in the East in winter. Numbers are concentrated on lakes in the Great Basin during migration.

Classes at Langruth Elementary will begin in September 8th, 2022. Many fun and interesting things are being planned for the coming school




