

Nature Notes

Broad Winged Hawk



The smallest of the North American buteos is similar in size to a stocky crow. These birds, which migrate in flocks of thousands, make up the bulk of the hawk flights in September in the East. This peaceful bird is one of the tamest hawks. In flight the tips of the flight feathers appear dark, producing a black border along the trailing edge of the wing, and the under wing linings vary from white to rusty-buff.

This hawk perches to watch for prey from utility poles and wires or near water along edge of woods. It hunts along wooded roads under the tree canopy. It swoops down to grab prey with talons. It preys on amphibians, reptiles, small rodents, shrews, rabbits, some small birds, large insects and insect larvae.

The nest is built of sticks, twigs and dead leaves. It is lined with inner bark strips with lichen, outer bark chips and green leaves. It is usually found in the crotch of a deciduous tree 9-15 meters above the ground. Both sexes build the nest in a slow process that takes 3-5 weeks.

The incubation is 28 - 32 days by both sexes, but mostly the female. The young stay in the nest 29 - 35 days and are fed by both sexes. They have 1 brood per year.

Large numbers of the Broad-winged Hawk were once shot during migration, particularly along mountainous ridges in the east. Law now protects them. If you happen to see a chocolate coloured crow that will be a Broad-Winged Hawk.

During the week of August 8th the sidewalk along Hwy 50 at Einarson Park in Langruth was replaced. It is a great face-lift to the campground and park area.

In June of 2021 the Manitoba government announced the recipients of the Building Sustainable Communities fund. The Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone was successful in receiving a grant for upgrades to Einarson Park and Campground. The Municipality partnered with the Langruth Community Initiatives Development Corporation (LICDC) to make this project happen.

Starting in the fall of 2021, improvements have included landscaping, low-maintenance flower beds, new picnic tables and fire pits, signage, benches and recycling bins. The new sidewalk along the park and campground was also part of the Park and Campground Beautification Project.

Constable Lee Hanneson Receives National Award

Constable Jason Towle of Portage la Prairie and Constable Lee Hanneson of Langruth, employed by the Winnipeg Police Service, were recently presented with Canadian Police Association (CPA) Awards of Excellence for their heroic efforts in safely evacuating 10 people from a multi-unit home which was fully engulfed in flames.

On April 29th, 2018 when both Towle and Hanneson were on patrol they noticed smoke in the area. After alerting the Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service (WFPS), they came upon the multi-unit home. The top floor of the home was fully engulfed in flames. The constables ran into the residence, directing residents from the first two floors out of the house. As a result of their heroic efforts, 10 residents were safely evacuated.

Towle and Hanneson were nominated for this award by the Winnipeg Police Association and were presented the award in Fredericton, New Brunswick, on August 25th.

Lee Hanneson, originally from the Langruth area, is the son of Bill and Phyllis Hanneson. Lee has worked with the Winnipeg Police force for ten years.
