## **Nature Notes**

## **Great Egret**

The largest white egret found over most of its range can be distinguished from other white egrets and juvenile



herons by its size, yellow bill and black legs and feet. This tall, slender-necked bird develops long trains of lacy plumes on its back that extend beyond the tail during breeding season and its vellow bill appears more orange in colour.

The Great Egret prefers to feed in open areas from salt marshes to freshwater habitats. It is diurnal in its activities; it flies singly or in groups to communal roosts in trees for the night. It feeds on a wide variety of small aquatic animals and animals found in wetland environments, from fish, to frogs, snakes, crayfish and large insects.

The Great Egret is colonial, usually with other species of herons, egrets, ibis and other similar species.

The nest is made of sticks, unlined or lined with fine material, in a tree or shrub. It is usually 3 - 12 metres above ground and is built by both sexes. The young stay in the nest for 21 days. They are fed by both sexes. There is one brood per year. Incubation is 23 to 26 days.

This bird was decimated by plume hunters in the late 1800s and has been protected since the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. In recent decades the breeding range has expanded northward.

With full protection in North America, the species is increasing. Still, factors such as polluted waters, coastal development and draining or wetlands negatively impact egrets.

Everyone was invited to participate in a Scavenger Hunt and Trivia Game. Painted rocks were hidden around the grounds. Each rock included answers to Scavenger Hunt questions. The trivia questions tested everyone's 'fall' and 'rural living' knowledge.

Lana Armstrong and Janie Ferguson kept a lot of little hands busy at a crafting station where the children could make an art project with various seeds. Thanks to Amanda Scora for her artistic ability in giving the children face paintings. Many kept an eye on the Cow Paddy Bingo Calf. Once the auction was finished the calf was moved into the bingo pen and everyone waited in anticipation to see which square the calf would drop a 'paddy' on first. The meeting was adjourned by Margaret Whiteley at 3:15 pm, seconded by Ann Craik.




## Dana Gardiner Inducted into Hall of Fame




