Nature Notes

Steller's Jay

Recognized as the only crested jay in the west, Steller's Jay is named after the Arctic explorer George Wilhelm Steller. He discovered this bird on the Alaska coast in 1741. In 1987 it was designated the provincial bird of British Columbia. The darkest jay in North America, it has a black head and crest and a sooty black back and breast. The extent of black on the body is variable among local populations as is the amount of blue or white striping on the head or throat.

Steller's Jays often mimic the calls of other birds, including loons and hawks. They are bold around campgrounds but somewhat shy in woods. They often travel in flocks of more than a dozen birds which include family groups after breeding season.

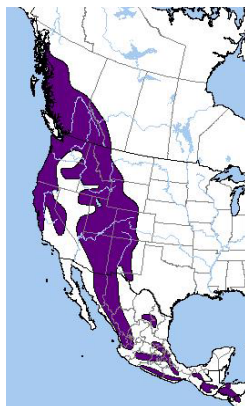
Steller's Jays most often feed in treetops and on the ground. They are omnivorous; they eat a wide variety of animal fare, including frogs, snakes, insects, carrion, eggs and the young of other birds. Approximately 70% of their annual diet (90 – 99 percent in winter) is comprised of pine seeds, acorns and fruit.

This species is known to be monogamous. It is known as a solitary nester. Courtship feeding is done by the male Steller's Jay.

The nest is cemented with mud and includes pine needles, twigs, dry leaves, roots and grass. It is typically on a horizontal limb near the trunk of or in a crotch of a conifer tree or occasionally a deciduous tree. The nest is 2 – 30 meters above the ground and is built by both sexes.


The incubation is 16-18 days mostly by the female. The young remain in the nest 17 – 21 days. They are fed by both sexes. They have 1 brood per year.

Steller's Jay is common in pine-oak and coniferous woodlands. Its population is both stable and increasing. They are at lower elevations during the winter season. Family groups often frequent feeders in winter.

Fire Prevention Week News

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape™", worked to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe from home fires.

Today's homes burn faster than ever. You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning.

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

Have a plan for everyone in the home. Children, older adults and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them.

Smoke alarms sense smoke will before you can, alerting you to danger. Smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway) and on each level (including the basement) of your home. Do not put smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms.

Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection.

For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home. These can be installed by a qualified electrician, so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.

In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

“Lest We Forget”

The Empty Stretcher

Margaret Cantelon interviewed a veteran of the First World War, and told his story in the first first person. This veteran was her brother “Jim Olafson” a pioneer of the Reykjavik area.

I came out of darkness into a world of devastation. The memory of my last moment of consciousness was so vivid I was sure I was dead – looking back. The darkness was complete and there was stillness around me, although I could hear noises far off, harmless noises to me. I was dead. A blinding flash and it was all over, no pain....

Then I realized that I could see, the darkness was not all the same. I could move my eyes. Mounds and bumps, and I remembered we were in mud. I knew I was somewhere in France, and I knew I wasn’t dead. I could feel the cold air on my face. Something was on top of me and I couldn’t move. Nothing would move, only my eyes.

I wondered how long I had been here. My last memory, clearly my mind brought back the words of the sergeant as he had handed me the rum can: “Here, Jim, and take a snort yourself before you start off. You need it if anyone does. How you find your way about in this mud I’m sure I don’t know.” But this was the very reason I had been chosen for this task – to take the rum ration to the boys out there somewhere in the swamp.

I was known as something of an expert on swamp travel, by night or day, for I had spent my boyhood in the marshlands of Lake Manitoba but here I was, at age 17, flat on my back, my swamp lore at an end. But I thought about it lying there in the mud, I even felt some pride in my craft. I was a scout, often sent out into No-Man’s-Land to creep within listening distance of the enemy trenches. I always came back. My comrades said I had a charmed life.

The words came back to me. I remembered somebody saying: “Jim, neither a bullet nor a German will ever get you, for a bullet will just slip off you, and you will always slip away from any German.” Maybe he was right but there are

more than bullets and Germans in the front line. It must have been an artillery shell that got me, maybe the first one to come over the night. I had been quiet and then suddenly nothing more to remember.

I could hear voices, I couldn’t hear the words. Were they Germans? They were coming closer. Would it be the bayonet? Then I heard English words, men talking in subdued voices, stretcher bearers; I could see their flashlights. I tried to shout and couldn’t speak. But I could hear them – “I don’t think there is anyone alive here They’re piled up on top of each other – poor fellows, they’re out of their misery.”

A tall man pulled the body from on top of me, and then another took a close look at me. I could see him but there was no recognition in his eyes. “Let’s move on.” somebody said, and suddenly I was afraid. They were going to leave me.

I could never tell you of the agony and fear I felt – to be left in the mud alone. I had no way to express my frustration and desperation, I lay there in disbelief that it was all to end this way. Then another voice said: “Look, this chap moved his eyes!”

They gathered around and put a flashlight on my eyes, and I just stared straight ahead into the light. Then hope within me died. They could see no movement. But I heard the same voice again, “I saw him move his eyes,” and then another voice added, “Let’s take him anyway – we’ve got an empty stretcher.

Editor’s Note:

Jim Olafson was born in the Big Point District. He was a first cousin of Archie Johnson and Gordon Thordarson. Jim and his father moved to Eddystone after the death of his mother.

He survived WWI and this experience. He went onto ranch in the Eddystone area where he raised his family.

RCMP Seeking Information Regarding Robbery

On October 1, 2022, at approximately 4:30 am, Portage la Prairie RCMP responded to a robbery and kidnapping that occurred on Provincial Road 227, in the RM of Westlake-Gladstone.

Two males were travelling in a truck with a camper, when they stopped for the night on PR 227, off Highway 16, in the RM of Westlake-Gladstone. One male was sleeping in the truck and the other male was sleeping in the camper. At 4:30 am, three males opened the door and yelled at the victim to get out of the vehicle. The male victim was assaulted and threatened with a firearm. The males got inside the truck and ran over the victim as they fled in the truck and camper. The suspects were aware that there was a male inside the camper when they fled.

Officers located the truck and camper and short time later near the intersection of Highway 16 and Highway 50. The suspects had fled but the victim, a 69-year-old male from India, was located safe inside the camper.

The other victim, a 33-year-old male was taken to hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

The suspects are described as male and possibly Hispanic or Indigenous, wearing dark clothing. One male had a large build and was wearing a dark coloured mask over his face.

As reported in the Winnipeg Free Press on October 12th, RCMP warns that a suspect in the rural carjacking is at large and has a history of violence.

Jesse Myles St. Paul, 29, of Portage la Prairie is wanted for robbery with a firearm and pointing a firearm, as well as two firearm possessions charges, in connection with the October 1st incident. He is known to frequent Portage and Ebb and Flow First Nation.

RCMP identified St. Paul as one of suspects and obtained a warrant for his arrest. St. Paul is 6-feet tall and 180 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes.

The public should not approach him, but call police if he is spotted. The other two suspects have not yet been identified.

GREAT PROSPECTS AT LANGRUTH

Messrs. Langdon and Ruth have just completed a sale of 1560 acres of block land in Lakeland in tp. 16, rge. 9. The purchasers are Messrs. Haney Bros. of Strathroy, Ont., price paid \$14 040. Purchasers will go into farming on an extensive scale and will establish a dairy, this being an ideal district for mixed farming. They will also start a large general store at the townsite surveyed on section 20, on the Oakland branch. This townsite is directly opposite Big Point. The C.N.R. is putting on an immediate service of one or two trains a week as far as this townsite. The place is not yet officially named. It will be shortly however, and will be placed on the market by the owners Messrs. McKenzie & Mann and Langdon & Ruth. Messrs.
