



#### **Nature Notes**

From the Archive of Raymond O'Connor

It is with sadness that we announce the passing of Raymond O'Connor, long time contributor of the Langruth Views *Nature Notes* column. Raymond was well known for his great love of nature and birds. Many speak of evenings at the community hall watching slide shows of the beautiful birds that Raymond photographed.

In memory of Raymond, the Langruth Views will continue to include *Nature Notes* from an archive of past submissions. May his legacy as a bird lover continue on. Rest in peace Raymond.

## Franklin's Gull

Often called the Prairie Dove, this gull is sometimes spotted on farmland following

implements to feed on grubs and other insects. The bird has a characteristic black hood in summer, but in winter its head is white with the reduced dusky hood covering its eye and reaching from mid-crown to nape. In light, it differs from the similar Laughing Gull by a white bar and white tips on primaries and a paler surface on the under wing primaries.

It is terrestrial in summer and winters on the Pacific Ocean from Central America southward.

It forages for food while walking, wading or swimming, sometimes spotting prey while hovering over water. This gull eats insects, fish, leeches, earthworms, crustaceans and snails. It sometimes catches insects while flying. It attends agricultural cultivating machinery taking exposed prey. Gulls are colonial.

The nest is lined with bulrushes, cattails and

other plant material and built by both sexes.

Incubation is 21-25 days long and by both sexes. Their first flight is at 32-35 days. They have 1 brood per year.

This gull is very beneficial.

## **Farewell to the Gladstone Hotel**

Tragically, the historic Gladstone Hotel was destroyed by fire early Christmas Morning. The blaze started about 1:45 am.

The Gladstone volunteer fire department responded and put in a request for mutual aid from neighboring communities. Firefighters from Neepawa and Plumas assisted throughout the night and into the next afternoon. The Gladstone Hotel was a complete loss and neighboring heritage buildings were damaged.

Around a dozen apartments were lost in the fire leaving more than 15 people without a home. Deepest sympathy to the family and friends of the person that lost their life in the fire.

The Gladstone Hotel, constructed in 1902, was originally a hardware and implement business owned by brothers Arnold Williams and William Williams (Williams Bros.). The two-storey brick building was constructed as the Williams Bros. business was expanding and flourishing. By 1906 hardware. furniture. they dealt in farm gasoline implements, carriages, engines, threshers, and every implement necessary for farming.

Following the burning of the original Alhambra Hotel on the East side of Morris Ave. in 1930, the Williams Bros. building was converted into a hotel with a front entrance, dining room and kitchen. The building was then renamed the *Alhambra Hotel* (same name as the original hotel that burned). The Alhambra Hotel had various owners over the years. In 1945 the interior of the hotel was modernized to include a lunch counter and booths. A new neon sign that could be seen for miles advertised the hotel.



#### A Fake Company, Money Mules and Bitcoin: The Cyberattack of WestLake-Gladstone

In early 2020, the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone became the victim of a sophisticated cyberattack — one that involved a fake company tricking over a dozen people into acting as intermediaries to swindle the municipality out of more than \$470,000.

It was a quiet January day in 2020 when the chief administrative officer of the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone noticed a series of unusual cash withdrawals from its bank account. The money had been sent to multiple bank accounts the municipality had never dealt with.

Investigation now shows it all began with a job advertisement by a seemingly legitimate company, with a professional website and a Nova Scotia address, claiming it was looking for cash processors.

The employees were told they would receive payments to their credit cards, which they would be expected to move to their bank accounts. They would then withdraw the payments, convert them into bitcoin, and send that to another account. These positions are referred to as 'money mules'.

In early December 2019, the cybercriminals sent a phishing email to multiple e-mail addresses. At least one person at the municipal office clicked on the link, which allowed the hackers to get into the municipality's computers and bank accounts. It was only after the money disappeared that the municipality discovered the two incidents were connected. RCMP doesn't believe the municipality was specifically targeted, but was unlucky enough to have an employee click on the malicious link.

Once the computer network was compromised, a person logged into the municipality's bank account and changed the password, along with the personal verification questions. The cyberattackers then added 18 'employees' hired as payees and began making withdrawals, transferring money to their credit cards. The money was then converted into bitcoin as instructed and sent to the private account of the scammers, who most likely weren't in Canada. Once money is out of Canadian banking institutions it becomes very difficult to trace.

Police say cybercrimes are on the rise and unfortunately it is not a crime that's going to go away.

# Keep Yourself Cyber Safe

Cyber scams are nothing new. Every day, con artists are looking for targets. Hackers don't need to know how much is in your bank account to want to get into it. Your identity, your financial data, what's in your email... it's all valuable. And cyber criminals will try to get to anyone they can.

Learn how you can reduce the chances of falling for the scams.

#### 1. Implement multi-factor authentication.

This means opting-into an extra step when websites and application ask you to confirm you are really who you say you are. Instead of just asking for a password your identity can be verified by asking for two forms of information - a security question, a confirmation text or a fingerprint or face ID.

#### 2. Update your software.

Attackers will exploit flaws in the system. Regular updates will capture fixes to the flaws and prevent attacks.

#### 3. Think before you click.

More than 90% of successful cyber-attaches start with a phishing email, a link or webpage that looks legitimate but it is a trick to have you reveal passwords and sensitive information. If something looks a little 'off', trust your instincts and think before you click.

#### 4. Use strong passwords.

Picking a password that is easy is like locking your door but hanging the key on the doorknob so anyone can get in. Use a unique password with various character types and is at least 15 characters long.
