Radar Speed Sign on Highway 50 Approaching Langruth

A radar speed sign has recently been located on Highway 50 just south of Langruth. Radar speed signs are interactive signs that display a vehicle's speed as motorists approach. The purpose of radar speed signs is to slow cars down by making drivers aware when they are driving at speeds above the posted limits. They can be used in addition to or instead of physical devices such as speed bumps and rumble strips.

Radar speed signs are often installed in areas where vehicles come in close proximity to pedestrians. The current speed limit on Highway 50 through the town of Langruth is 50 km/hr. It is important that drivers adhere to that limit considering that Langruth Elementary School, Lakeview Children's Centre, Einarson Park and the Purple Martin Park are all along Highway 50. There is also significant pedestrian crossing at MJ Stop & Shop and the Langruth Community Hall. The goal is for drivers to reduce their speeds through town to make the road safe for everyone.



Results show that with radar speed signs:

- Motorists slow down up to 80% of the time when alerted by a radar sign.
- Typical speed reductions are 10 20%.
- Overall compliance with the posted speed limit goes up by 30 60%.
- Radar signs are particularly effective at getting motorist driving 20 km/hr or more over the posted speed limit to slow down.

Nature Notes

Pied-Billed Grebe

The most widespread and best-known grebe in North America sometimes hides from intruders by sinking until only its head shows above water or by diving like other members of the group. This stocky grebe has a large head and short thick bill that gives it a chicken like profile, easily distinguishing it from other grebes, even at a distance. The bill is light-coloured and has a black ring around it during the breeding season but lacks the ring in winter.

The Pied-billed Grebe forages by diving from the surface and swimming underwater, propelled by its feet. It feeds on some vegetation but about half of the diet is made up of aquatic insects with the remainder split almost equally between small fish and crustaceans.

The nest of the Pied-billed Grebe is a platform of decaying vegetation, inconspicuously anchored to vegetation in open water among reeds or rushes. It is built by both sexes.

The incubation is 23-27 days by both sexes, but the female does more. The young move from the nest to the adult's back less than an hour after hatching. They take their first flight in about 35-37 days. They are fed by both sexes. The Pied Billed Grebe has 1-2 broods per year.



Manitoba's Important Bird Areas (IBAs)

Manitoba is home to 38 IBAs.

Lions Foundation Conducts Vision Screening in Langruth

The Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario recently conducted a free vision-screening for children through the Kidsight project in Langruth.

Vision screening is important because, according to educational and visions experts, 80% of learning is visual. Many children do not have a vision screening until they have noticeable problems seeing, learning or paying attention in school. Vision screening for all children is important because some vision problems are treatable if caught early.

The Kidsight project has Lions Club volunteers conduct vision-screening sessions in local communities. Screening devices detect risk factors, such as strabismus (eyes that cross or wander out) or refractive errors (the need for glasses) as well as additional vision issues which can be found in children at an early age.

The vision screening results are provided to the guardian who is encouraged to visit a local optometrist if the screening tool detects potential vision problems.

The screening does not replace seeing an optometrist. It is used as a means to identify kids with potential vision issues and to encourage guardians to seek professional attention if recommended. The Lions Club volunteers are thoroughly trained but they are not medical professionals and the vision-screening report is not a diagnosis. A complete examination is required by an optometrist.

How To Use a One-Lane Roundabout



The new entrance into Portage La Prairie from Highway 1 West now includes a Traffic Circle or Roundabout. Roundabouts can be intimidating at first but they are designed with features that promote safe and efficient traffic flow.

At roundabouts vehicles travel around a raised center island in a counterclockwise direction, with entering traffic yielding the right-of-way to circulating traffic. The tight circle of a roundabout forces drivers to slow down making the most common intersection crashes unlikely.

Drivers are typically skeptical of roundabouts when they are first in service but opinions quickly change when drivers become familiar with them.
