Eagle Eye Excavation has been busy installing water lines throughout the Langruth/Lakeland area for the expansion of the Yellowhead Regional Water Co-op. Many of the east-west lines have already been installed. Eagle Eye Excavations will continue installing the water lines in municipal right of ways, Provincial Highways right of way and/or by easement on private properties through to approximately November 2023.

If you are currently farming a municipal right of way, including ditch areas and roadways, please note that there could be crop damage to the area that the contractor needs to access. The Municipality will **NOT** be reimbursing or compensating for any crop damage or loss on municipal right of ways due to the construction of the water line.

Nature Notes

From the Archive of Raymond O'Connor

Blue Jay

Once considered primarily a forest dweller, the Blue Jay has adapted to cities, parks, gardens, and forest fragmentations. Some populations remain in locales year-round, while more northern ones migrate south in flocks of 50 - 100. The Blue Jay is common despite clear-cutting forest. Its range is expanding northwest. The Blue Jay is easily recognized by its large size, blue-purple under parts, wings and tail and its jaunty bluish purple crest.

The Blue Jay is found usually in pairs or flocks. It is especially gregarious after nesting season. It lives in oak and beech trees. The Blue Jay is typically noisy and shrieks alone or in groups at cats, snakes, owls, hawks and hunters.

The Blue Jay is omnivorous but over 70 percent of its diet is plant matter. It especially likes acorns, pine seeds, corn, fruits and berries. Animal fare includes insects, carrion, eggs and young of other birds, snails, fish, frogs, small reptiles and small mammals. The Blue Jay stores acorns in the ground for winter. This is a major factor in establishing and distributing oak forests as many seeds are not found and thus germinate.

Did You Know??

Did you know that in the early 19th century, traders of the Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) would spend their winters at the mouth of the Whitemud River, along the shore of Lake Manitoba? In 1815, a winter fur-trade post was established in the Big Point area and was called Big Point House or Manitoba Lake House [Trading Post B.122]. This was a site that HBC traders from Albany had wintered at in earlier years. In 1820, new buildings were erected at the site. By 1824, Big Point House was in operation again as a winter post. It was closed sometime after 1894.

Establishments of the HBC, including Trading Posts, kept post journals. The post journals from Big Point House document the post's establishment as well as weather, daily activities and occurrences of note. The journal dated 1818-1819 also contains a report on the Manitoba District during District Master William Brown's journeys. Post journals were sent annually to the Governor and Committee in London, and copies were often preserved at the posts.

the daily life at the trading post have been digitized and are available online. The Government of Manitoba Archives web site is listed above.

5. Manitoba is a bilingual province. Manitoba was officially established as a bilingual province in 1870. The four main languages spoken in Manitoba are English, French, Cree, and Ojibwe (Anishinaabe).

Their home in Winnipeg will be fondly remembered as the place to be when family was visiting the big city, all were welcomed and encouraged to enjoy and share a hearty meal, tall stories and an occasional drink or two.

After Ragnar passed in 1996, our family was happy when Freda was fortunate to find a Gordon McInnis in 2001. They became a couple in 2002 when she moved to Brandon and they enjoyed golfing, dancing and travelling. She was welcomed with open arms into the family by Gordon's children, Melvin, Carol-Anne, Joni, Gwen and Neil. She enjoyed being a part of the McInnis family and they have all maintained loving contact with her after Gordon passed away in 2011.

Freda cared for many friends and family members throughout the years, often making new friends along the way. She was an incredible baker, who always made sure her treats were just right by taste testing a small corner piece first, "To make sure it was okay for everyone else to eat." Known for her kind spirit, contagious laughter and cunning card playing, Freda was loved by all and never went anywhere without a few Bud Light in her purse in case an impromptu party broke out.

Freda was predeceased by her loving husband (Ragnar); partner (Gordon); daughter (Ingrid) and many other brothers, sisters and family members. Her fiery spirit is carried on by her loving son Rodney (Anita); grandchildren, Nikolas, Anna (Geoff), Erik (Tara) and Krista (Nik); eight greatgrandchildren, (Jordyn, Sloane, Braxton, Reece, Briggs, Beau, Cecelia and Aiyanna); one surviving sibling, Audrey Clayton (Earl) and too many nieces and nephews to mention.

Her last piece of advice before she left was to not take yourself too seriously, travel lots, enjoy time with loved ones and never, ever substitute chili powder for cinnamon to a batch of ginger snap cookies because no one will ever let you forget it.
