Margaret Whitely adjourned the meeting at 3:00 pm, seconded by Ann Craik.




Yellowhead Regional Water Co-op Rural Water Lines

Nature Notes

American Tree Sparrow

After nesting near the frigid tundra regions, flocks of these sparrows migrate south and can be found primarily in the United States during the winter. Sometimes they travel in flocks of thirtyfive to forty birds, but often smaller. They scout out food supplies and willingly come to outdoor feeders. Males often winter farther north than females and juveniles. These birds spend their summer in open landscapes and their winters near the forest edge.

Males sing during courtship and also to claim territory. They are typically in pairs on breeding ground and in flocks in winter. They are relatively tame and conspicuous.

Juveniles have paler upper parts and streaking on the head, breast and sides.

The American Tree Sparrow forages for food by scratching on the ground, foliage or snow. They eat mostly seeds. They also eat insects and caterpillars in summer, as well as some berries and catkins of willow. They are fairly common in weedy fields, open areas of brush and scattered trees.

The nest of the American Tree Sparrow is built of stems, bark pieces, moss and grass with a lining of feathers, fur and hair. It is atop a clump of grass or moss, rarely low in a shrub or tree. The nest is 30 cm to 1.5 m above the ground and is built by the female.

The incubation is 12-13 days by the female. The young are brooded by the female and remain in the nest for 8-10 days. They are fed by both sexes. The American Tree Sparrow has 1 brood per year.

Remembering When the Langruth Elevator was Relocated to Westroc

LANGRUTH - About 100 onlookers gathered to watch a Manitoba Pool crew move Langruth's lone grain elevator from its location on the soonto-be abandoned Amaranth CNR branch line to a new site 26 kilometres south on Highway 16.

Within five hours the 27-metre high prairie monolith was relocated to Westroc, the site of a \$1.2 million grain handling facility scheduled to begin taking deliveries in 1984.

"I've never seen such a sight," retired farmer Ed Kelm said as the elevator lumbered pas his car on Highway 50, the paved route of the moving crew, "I've seen some big buildings moved before, but nothing like this."

Kelm, who lives in Amaranth was awed by the event. Leland Bergson, a resident of Langruth for the past 10 years, expressed grief.

"There goes the elevator ... there goes the town," Bergson said at the scene. He compared losing the elevator to the closure of the Langruth High School about six years earlier.

"First they take the kids, then they take the elevator. And pretty soon the railway tracks will be gone."

"I heard one guy say he always knew he was near Langruth when he saw the grain elevator, now there's nothing to see." Bergson said.

Classes at the local elementary school were suspended temporarily while the structure moved by. Principal Randy Penner said a one-hour power outage, caused by power lines disconnected to allow the elevator to pass through town, was the official reason for the break in studies.

"But it was quite an event. Buzzers were sounding in the school. We were all pretty excited," Penner said. Students gathered in classroom adjacent to the route of the elevator to watch the spectacle.

A 1941 tractor trailer was used to pull the 90ton elevator, along with two winch trucks. A special moving crew of 18 men, employed by Manitoba Pool Elevators, was assigned to the project.

Three traffic control vehicles escorted the building down Highway 50. The road, a provincial trunk highway, was closed curing the move and traffic was rerouted down a parallel municipal road.

A total of 90 tires beneath a platform of flatbed trailers supported the elevator. Manitoba Hydro crews disconnected 15 power lines along the route.

Westroc, the new delivery point for Langrutharea farmers, is located 40 kilometres north west of Portage la Prairie. It is expected to be fully operational when the Amaranth branch line is abandoned late in 1984.

In 1947, a 40,000-bushel wooden grain elevator was constructed at Langruth by Manitoba Pool Elevators for a newly formed Langruth Cooperative Elevator Association. Three years later, to help in handling a bumper crop, a balloon annex was built increasing its capacity to 85,000 bushels. In 1953, a second balloon annex increased it further, to 135,000 bushels. https://www.mhs.mb.ca/docs/sites/langruthelevator.shtml
