Fire Prevention Week

During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults and teachers learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. Firefighters provide public education in an effort to decrease casualties caused by fires.

This year's Fire Prevention Week™ campaign, **"Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire preventions™"**, works to educate everyone about simple but important actions that can be taken to be safe when cooking.

Did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries?

Cook with Caution!

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire – oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains – away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire ...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire ...

- Just get out! Close all doors behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 from outside the home.

All the favorite activities were back; the signature large round hay bale jumping area, Don's Small Animal Petting Zoo, the bouncy castles, the hay ride, archery, old fashioned races, crafts, face painting and more. Don Winthrop has brought his petting zoo to 6 out of 8 festivals. (There was no petting zoo in 2020 and 2021 due to public health restrictions). Don has decided to retire and make this his last year. Thank-you to Don for always joining us and for a generous donation of \$50 to a draw for anyone who could name all his animals. Veronica Clark was the lucky winner.

New this year was the Touch-A-Truck area. A variety of vehicles and equipment were available for everyone to see up close. Also new this year was a Graffiti Station. Check out the graffiti car! It speaks for itself as to how much fun everyone had. Thanks to Lorne Hunt for providing the car for the children to paint their hearts away on. A big thanks to Janie Ferguson for running the new Graffiti Station.

Children of all ages were challenged to pull a tractor in the *Tractor Pull Challenge*. Children aged 6 and under began pulling on the rope. Age groups were added until there were about 35 people pulling before the tractor finally moved. Great team work!

Admission to the Harvest Festival is free. Fundraisers and donations help fund the many free activities throughout the day. Thank-you to Neepawa-Gladstone Co-op, Simplot, Richardson-Pioneer and GWB Auto Sales for donations to the canteen and prizes.

Nature Notes

From the Archive of Raymond O'Connor

Pine Siskin

In fall and winter the Pine Siskin is a common visitor to northern forests, where it forages in flocks that may include several thousand birds. When food is scarce these daytime migrants may travel as far south as Florida and central Mexico, flying in tightly formed flocks. In flight the yellow wing stripe at the base of the flight feather and the yellow base to the outer tail feathers are conspicuous. Females are similar to males but with more washed-out yellow plumage. Juveniles resemble females but show a yellowish wash overall.

The Pine Siskin is often tame and may allow close approach. They are gregarious; they are found in small groups or flocks year round. They are weakly territorial or not at all. Pairs nest close to one another often in the same tree.

They forage on the ground and in trees for seeds from alders, birches, spruce and other trees. They also eat thistle seeds, weeds and some insects in summer. They are nomadic in fall and in winter. They are attracted to salt licks and salt treated winter highways. Fatalities are high in winter because the birds become reluctant to fly off the highway. They also feed on sap at drill wells created by sapsuckers. They enjoy mixed seeds, thistle and black oil sunflower seeds at feeders.

The nest is made of bark, moss, feathers and animal fur. It is lined with grass and twigs. It is usually hidden in conifer trees placed far out from the trunk between 3 and 15 meters above the ground. The nest is built by the female.

The incubation is 13 days by the female. The young are brooded by the female and stay in the nest 14 – 15 days. They are fed by both sexes. They have 1 brood per year.

The Pine Siskin is widespread and abundant in coniferous and mixed conifer-deciduous forests, in woodlands, parks, weedy fields and near human habitation. The mountain populations descend to lower elevations prior to winter onset.

Yellowhead Regional Water Co-op Rural Water Lines

Eagle Eye Excavation continues to install water lines throughout the Langruth/Lakeland area for the expansion of the Yellowhead Regional Water Co-op. The main line to the existing water plant at Langruth has now been installed and the ditches along Road 94 have been re-contoured. Work is expected to continue through to approximately November 2023.
