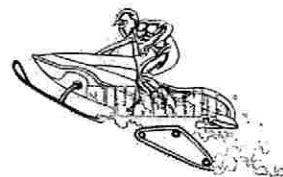

Nature Notes

From Raymond O'Connor

European Starling

This chunky European species was introduced to North America in 1890 in New York City's Central Park and has become so well established that large flocks have in some cases become a nuisance, roosting in cities and towns from coast to coast in Canada and the USA and to the tree line.

Tenacious in nature, this bird competes with native species such as woodpeckers, flycatchers, and blue birds for nesting holes. This bird's winter plumage shows white specks and its yellow bill becomes a dull gray. Juveniles are sooty gray-brown overall with pale streaking on the under parts and a dull brown bill.

The European Starling sings various trilling melodies, clear whistles, clatters and twitters in groups. It imitates songs of other birds including Eastern Wood-pewee and Northern bobwhite, as well as mechanical sounds. The singing male often stands erect and flaps wings vigorously in display.



This bird is solitary or in pairs during breeding season. Juveniles form foraging flocks. They are gregarious after breeding season, forming flocks with juveniles for foraging roosting. It joins other species in winter roosts, which may number more than a million birds.

The European Starling most often feeds in open areas, primarily on the ground. It eats various insects, fruits and grain. The muscles that open its bill are stronger than those that close it. This is a unique trait that allows this bird to insert its bill in vegetation or into the ground and then pry it open to reveal food.

The nest is made of grass, twigs, forbs, rootlets, and straw, in a natural hollow of a tree, bird boxes or abandoned woodpecker holes 3-8 meters above the ground. The nest is built by both sexes.

Incubation is 12-14 days by both sexes, but the female does more. The young are brooded by the female. They stay in the nest for 18 – 21 days. They are fed by both sexes. The first flight is at about 26 days. Two to three broods are produced per year.

Canadian and U.S. laws do not protect nongame, non-native species.

Icelandic Sheep Come to Big Point

The Jonasson family are now the proud owners of a pair of Icelandic sheep.

Ted read an article in the paper about Icelandic sheep and contacted the folks in the Interlake. After waiting over a year they were able to purchase a ram and a ewe from two different locations around Frazerwood. Thor (the ram) is a brown color with a hint of red and Mary (the ewe) is white with black markings. They both have horns.



The sheep are prized for their wool which in its natural colours is used in the making of the beautiful Icelandic sweater.

Icelandic sheep are descended from the Northern European short tail breeds and were brought to Iceland by the Vikings in the middle ages. The vigour, hardiness and variety of uses for these sheep made them a cornerstone of the Viking settlement and later development of Icelandic culture. The first importation into Canada occurred in 1985. Genetically the Icelandic sheep is the same today as it was 1100 years ago. It is possibly the oldest and purest domesticated breed of sheep in the world today.

The Icelandic sheep are of medium size with mature ewes weighing 150-160 lbs. and rams 200-220 lbs. They are fine boned with open face and legs and udders. The breed has both polled and horned individual of both sexes but it is primarily horned. Icelandic sheep are not particularly tall but broad and have an excellent

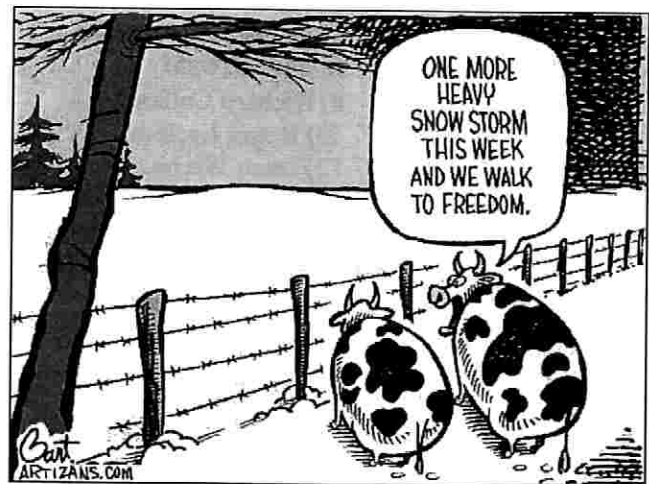
conformation as a meat breed. They are early maturing and the ewes can easily lamb at 12 months of age. Ram lambs can start breeding around seven months old. Life expectancy is long, healthy ewes commonly lambing until they are 12 to 14 years old in Iceland. The wool is dual coated and comes in many natural colors, even though the white color is most common.

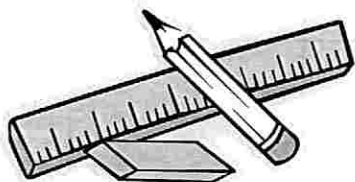
