
Langruth Community History Books

Nature Notes

American Crow

One of the most widely distributed and recognized birds in North America, the American Crow is entirely black



from beak to toe to tail with a glossy violet sheen. Studies of these intelligent birds have shown that they can count, solve puzzles, learn symbols, and retain information. They are often seen charging and mobbing owls and hawks.

Huge flocks from a few hundred to as many as 200,000 birds may assemble in winter to roost, travel and feed together. Often persecuted, shot, poisoned, and even bombed on its roost in the past, this crow still lives among us by its intelligence and adaptability and is common throughout its range. They have been widely persecuted in the past by farmers and hunters. They are still legally hunted for sport.

Crows eat insects, many other small invertebrates from millipedes to snails, small amphibians, small reptiles, small mammals, eggs and the young of other birds, waste corn and other grains, fruits, field crops, garbage and carrion. Mobs of avian predators call gangs of crows together to harass a large hawk or owl on a perch or drive it out of the area. They catch up to a soaring hawk and repeatedly dive on it from above, often forcing it down into the shelter of trees below. The crows break mollusk shells by dropping them on rocks from above.

The nest of the American Crow is made of twigs and branches, lined with tree material, grass, feathers, moss, leaves, and hair. It is placed in the fork of a tree or shrub up to 30m above the ground. It is sometimes on the ground on the prairies. The nest is built by both sexes and sometimes extra birds.

The incubation is 18 days by both sexes. The young are brooded by the female and remain in the nest for 28-35 days. They typically have one brood per year but can have 2 per year in the south.

2013 Provincial Flood Outlook

The Province's second 2013 spring flood outlook, issued on March 26th, notes that the potential for a spring flood is higher than previously predicted in the February outlook. This is due mainly to the additional snow fall and delayed runoff.

There is an increased risk of moderate to major spring flood potential for the Red, Souris, Pembina and Assiniboine rivers, and in the Interlake. Significant overland flooding is expected to develop in most areas of the province.

The magnitude of the spring flood potential is still very dependent on future weather conditions from now until the spring melt.

We have been blocked in more times this winter than usual. I have been really surprised how often the highway has been closed.
