#### Nature Notes

From Raymond O'Connor

#### Canvasback

A sloping profile from the front of its crown to the tip of its long dark bill distinguishes this bird. It is one of the largest and heaviest ducks in North



America. At a distance the male appears white with a black rear and breast. The long neck and head are rich rust-red. The female is grayer with a rusty tint to the neck and head.

The Canvasback is a wary species that often rafts well away from the shoreline. It flies high, frequently in formations and dives deeply to feed on aquatic vegetation and mollusks.

The nest is of dead vegetation lined with down. It is in marsh stands of vegetation above water and sometimes on dry ground. The nest is built by the female.

Incubation is 23-29 days long by the female. The young take their first flight at about 56 – 60 days. They are tended by the female. They have 1 brood per year.

A decline in population is primarily blamed on nesting habitat loss. Releases from hunting pressures and development of nesting habitats may have stabilized populations.

Every year in Manitoba approximately 160 cyclists are hospitalized for cycling related injuries, with several resulting in serious injury or death. About 40% of these injuries occur to cyclists under the age of 18.

In effort to reduce the number of cycling head injuries, on May 1<sup>st</sup> a new law took effect which requires cyclists under the age of 18 to wear a properly fitted and fastened protective helmet. Helmets must be certified by standards such as the Canadian Standards Association (CSA), Snell Memorial Foundation, the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) or the American National Standards Institute (ANSI).

Wearing a properly fitted helmet has been shown to reduce brain injuries by 88% and head injury by 85%. In order to properly fit your helmet there is a simple rule to follow, the rule is called: 2-V-1

- 2 Two finger distance from helmet to eyebrows
- V- V-shape straps around both ears
- 1- One finger between chin and strap

Once your helmet is fitted properly and in place, make sure you follow the 3Rs of safe cycling:

- Same Road- Bike and car share the road
- Same Rights -You have a right to your space on the road
- Same Rules- Everyone must follow traffic signs

This season, keep your head safe and ride safely!!

#### Municipal Amalgamation



In November 2012, The Provincial Government of Manitoba announced that it plans to amalgamate 87 municipalities with fewer than 1000 residents before the municipal election next fall. Neither your municipal nor provincial representatives ran on the campaign to amalgamate municipalities.

# The provincial government is planning on forcing our municipality to amalgamate this spring. What do you think?

The organization that represents incorporated municipalities is the Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM). The AMM does not oppose amalgamation if it is voluntary. The AMM does, however, strongly oppose forced amalgamation, and it opposes the very short timelines suggested by the government.

It also opposes the elimination of public input through an independent body, the Manitoba Municipal Board, in what may be one of the most important decisions your community will ever make!

The AMM has clearly communicated its position to the provincial government, and offered a number of compromises.

- The Province of Manitoba should assess the viability and sustainability of the communities it is targeting;
- The Province could then assist municipalities who <u>choose</u> to amalgamate by providing all the support necessary, monitoring the implementation and highlighting its benefits;
- And, the Province could work with those municipalities that are struggling to be sustainable on acceptable timelines that will result in better service delivery.
