Portage Evangelical Church Mission Trip

During spring break, Portage Evangelical Church sent a team of 37 people, by bus, to El Paso, Texas, on a 10 day mission trip.

We went to El Paso, Texas to build a play structure for a Church and to connect with the people there. We met some hard-working people who were passionate about Christ, and we faced some challenges along the way.

Upon our arrival, we were greeted by Pastor Jeremy, his wife Tara, Rosemary, Robin, and Zac. They were our leaders, drivers, cooks, and friends for the week. We also had the privilege of meeting Pastor Roberto, the Pastor of El Sembrador Church, and his wife. Pastor Roberto is a man with a strong faith. He told us how the Lord provided him with a building for his church, and that he had been praying for many years that God would send him a team to help him at his church. In that time period he had seen many mission teams, but none of them stopped in El Paso. They all just went right through into Mexico. Then God answered his prayer this year by sending our team to help him. The whole time we were there he was smiling and praising God.

In addition to building the play structure at El Sembrador, we also painted the nursery, sanctuary, and the foyer; built a patio, fixed some wiring; and fixed cracks in the walls. The ladies on the team all went to Teen Challenge one morning, while the men did work around Grandview Baptist Church, where we were staying. Some of us also had the opportunity to go and speak at the Youth for Christ clubs in the high schools.

We saw a lot of God, as he helped us overcome different challenges we faced on the trip. He kept us safe as we drove through a snowstorm on the way down, and gave us the patience and love we needed in order to get along with each other, on our two day bus journey and while living in such close quarters in the church (all the ladies slept in bunk beds in one room and the men slept on mattresses on the floor in another room). The Lord also kept us calm when all of our leaders left us at El Sembrador, without

directions on how to get back to Grandview! Even though we were not supposed to have cell phones with us (because the leaders didn't want it to take away from our time with God, and our interaction with each other), God must have known we were going to need one, as one of the ladies on the team had forgotten to leave hers at the church. This proved to be very handy, as we used it to get directions on Google Maps, and we made it back safely.

Everyone on our team grew in their faith through the challenges we faced, the people we met, the work we did, and even just by talking and working with people on our own team. Our theme verse for the trip was; Silver or gold I do not have, but what I do have I will give to you. Acts 3:6

Nature Notes

Whip-Poor-Will

The Whip-Poor-Will is best located and identified by its distinctive calls. It is nearly impossible to see because it tends to sit on the ground or lengthwise on a branch. Its pattern closely matches the leaf litter of the wood lots it frequents. "Whips" have rounded wings that when folded do not reach to the tip of the tail. Males are similar to females but the throat is bordered with white and the tail has large white patches.

Incubating or perched birds often allow a close approach. They fly close to the ground at night and catch large flying insects, especially medium to large moths. Their large eyes, like those of other creatures active at night, reflect light with a red eye-shine. In rural areas, birds often sit along dirt or gravel roads in the open at night.

The Whip-Poor-Will lays its eggs on the flat ground on a leaf litter. Incubation is 19-20 days by the female. Semiprecocial young stay in the nest for 20 days. They are fed by both sexes. They have 1-2 broods per year.

The population has declined in the east in recent decades because of habitat loss caused by forest fragmentation and development.
