## Nature Notes

From Raymond O'Connor

### Cedar Waxwing

Named for the red wax-like tips on its secondaries, this social bird travels in large flocks in the nonbreeding season and may even nest in loose colonies. The purpose of the 'red wax' is long debated, but younger birds do not have it and the older birds that do often choose each other as mates and produce more than the younger pairs. At times this bird may become so intoxicated on overripe fruit it cannot fly.

Females are similar to males but show a brownish rather than a blackish throat. This is a difficult field mark that can be observed only at close range.

Cedar waxwings are typically found in pairs or in small to large flocks. They are gregarious, especially in migration and winter.

They are tame and sociable. They feed close to other birds in trees or on the ground. Their diet is made up of fruit, flower petals and insects and they drink sap. Several may sit on a wire or branch and pass a piece of fruit back and forth, beak to beak. They hunt insects along streams, particularly mayfly hatches and those of similar species.

During courtship, male and female will sit together and pass flower petals back and forth, share food and rub bills.

A cedar waxwing's nest is made of sticks, mosses and grass on a limb or in a fork of a deciduous tree 2 – 18 meters above the ground and lined with fine grass, moss, rootlets, and hair. The nest is built by both sexes.

Incubation is 12-16 days by both sexes but the young are brooded by the female. The young birds are altricial and stay in the nest 14-18 days. They are fed by both sexes. One to two broods are produced per year.

The cedar waxwing is not a common cowbird host. It often rejects or damages its eggs.

### School Bus Safety Rules

#### For Motorists

- Flashing yellow lights on the school bus indicate that the bus is getting ready to stop and load or unload. This means that you need to slow down and get ready to stop.
- Flashing red lights indicate that the bus has stopped and that children are getting on or off. It is illegal to pass a school bus from either direction once it's stopped and has its lights activated unless there is a physical barrier (such as a median) between your vehicle and the bus.
- As soon as the bus driver turns on the flashing red lights, drivers coming from both directions must immediately stop at least five metres from the bus and remain stopped until the lights stop flashing, the STOP arm folds away and the bus begins to move.



- Be extremely cautious around school buses and remember that young children are prone to sudden movements.

#### For Parents

Educate your children about bus safety etiquette:

- Teach them to stay away from the three danger zones – the front, sides and back of the bus by staying at least three meters (10 feet) away from the school bus.
- If children must cross the street, they must never cross behind the school bus; they should seek the driver's permission, take five giant steps past the front of the bus and make sure the driver has seen them before crossing.
- Teach them to be mindful of other traffic as well before crossing the road.
- If children drop something near or under the school bus, they should never attempt to retrieve it without the driver's permission.
- Ensure that they get to the bus stop at least five minutes before the school bus arrives.
- Teach them to never run after the school bus if they arrive late at the bus stop.
- Teach them to take five giant steps away from the road when the school bus is approaching.

#### For Children

- Always wait until the school bus has come to a complete stop before boarding the bus.
- Line up single file to board the bus.
- Refrain from pushing or shoving on the bus.
- Use the handrail to get on and off the bus.
- Do not throw things.
- Always listen to the school bus driver.
- Stay seated until the bus has come to a complete stop.
- Get off the bus in a single file.
